The Latest War News

The Daily Jumble Rectified for those Who Want Facts.

Tuesday morning's dispatches. The nature of the struggle between the Germans and the allied forces on the battle front in France, which stretches from Noyon in the west to Verdun in the east, is indicated by the 1. test official communication from the French war office which says that the engagements have become less violent.

From this it would seem as if both sides had reached the conclusion that the gaining of a few yards of ground hardly warranted the losses entailed and that negotiations are on the way for a strong offensive movement at some strategic forest.

On their left wing they have reached the heights of Lesaigny. With the French on this part of the battle line are the British, who according to an official statement issued by the British press bureau, have fared badly since the beginning of the war in the loss of officers.

The casualty lists show that 797 British officers are among and missing, a very high percentage of the total losses. Among these are 35 colonels and lieutenant-colonels, 85 majors and 248 captains. The German Guards have lost 81 of their officers, the highest on the list.

The German Emperor has taken up his quarters in Luxembourg, according to a Paris dispatch. To guard against possible raids by French aviators a squadron of German aeroplanes is held in readiness.

A Vladivostok dispatch says Japanese aeroplanes have destroyed with bombs two of the important forts at Tsing Tau in the German protectorate of Kiaochow, while Peking reports that a British detachment left Tsing Tau Saturday to assist the Japanese in the attack in that place.

The Montenegrin army is believed to be close to Sara Jovo, Capital of Bosnia. The Montenegrin Foreign Office learns that the Austrian is in retreat.

Because of his disapproval of the action of the British Government in seeking the conquest of German southwest Africa, Brigadier-General Bayers, commandant-general of the Union of South Africa's defence forces has resigned.

President Wilson, it is reported from Washington, while announcing that he is "prayerfully working for peace in Europe," will take no steps for the present regarding mediation.

Resolutions by Republicans.

Condemn the Expenditures by County Commissioners Without a Vote of The People.

At the recent county convention held in Salisbury by the Republicans and Progressives the following interesting and worthy resolutions were passed:

We, Citizens of Rowan County, in Convention assembled do hereby reaffirm and endorse the many reforms which have repeatedly been endorsed and set forth in former county convention platforms to wit:

1. Placing the county officers on salaries.

2. Abolishing the unnecessary office of Salisbury Township tax collector.

3. Abolishing the office of County treasurer.

4. A more equitable assessment of real and personal property and the appointment of assessors who are thoroughly capable and will not show favoritism.

5. To deposit county funds with banks that will allow interest on deposits.

We condemn the practice, which is forbidden by law, of transferring funds for use in one department from the source where it properly belongs.

We favor a more minute and explanatory system of yearly reports. Especially of all sinking funds, amount on hand and how invested.

We condemn the expenditure of large sums for any purpose without first submitting the issue to the people. We believe a limit should be placed on all county commissioners as to the amount of indebtedness they can assume legally without a vote of the people.

We endorse the efforts of our people who are seeking to have public service corporations to have twice a month pay day.

We heartily endorse the Australian ballot law and are in favor of honesty in primaries and general elections.

We are in favor of the repealing of the present obnoxious and unjust local calf law.

We condemn the slackness with which our child labor law is enforced and the failure of the County Superintendent of Public Instruction to attend to his mill inspection duties.
