At a meeting of the Pastors Association of Salisbury and Spencer, Monday morning a committee from the Chamber of Commerce was heard with a request that different pastors preach a sermon on city improvements. This the pastors present agreed to do.

James Chambers and A. L. Logan, both white men and from Rowan County were arrested near Mocksville, last Sunday charged with stealing several coops of chickens north of Statesville. They stated their purpose for stealing the chickens was to dispose of same to help support their families which were large. Both men were employees at the Spencer shops and say that the shops closing down accounted for them taking to stealing as a livelihood. They are in jail awaiting trial not being able to furnish the required \$800 bond.

E. B. Neave, Jr. has qualified for the office of auditor for Rowan County and an office was assigned him in the court house Monday.

The Livingston College of this city has raised the sum of \$50,000 building fund for the rebuilding of the girls dormitory which was destroyed by fire some years ago. This building and probably another will be erected this year.
