**South Carolina Votes for Prohibition.**

South Carolina voters balloted yesterday on the question whether State-wide prohibition shall be adopted or the present county option system retained. If prohibition carries will become effective January 1 next.

The local option advocates last August endeavored to have the act under which the legislature authorized the election declared unconstitutional. All of the judges in the State at a meeting held in Columbia decided that the measure was constitutional.

Under the present law 14 of the 44 counties operate liquor dispensaries.

The vote with almost complete returns from a majority of the 44 counties, stood 38,104 for prohibition, to 14,157 against. It was declared by those who have followed the referendum election that the total vote would not exceed 90,000.

Governor Manning, who was elected on a local option platform whereby the individual counties may operate liquor dispensaries, issued a statement tonight after reading the returns, in which he said that "the people having spoken," he would do his utmost to enforce the law.

How can one play an 'errorless game' in life? Ought we not to be more considerate of each others' faults? And should we not continually look to the great Forgiver to correct and counteract the errors we make?"

**To Test Invention for Stopping Torpedoes.**

New Bern, Sept. 5.—Whether the invention of William Dixon of Oriental which he claims will put a stop to a torpedo after it has been fired at a ship, will prove to be a success, will be proven in a few days when official tests are made of it in "Nause river off Oriental. Lieutenant Hollis Connor, U. S. N., and instructor-inspector of the North Carolina Naval Militia and inspector of the shells manufactured at Raleigh, will go to Oriental within a day or two to inspect Mr. Dixon's invention and to see actual tests made of it.

The device is controlled by electricity and Mr. Dixon claims that eight seconds warning after a torpedo is fired at a ship, he can prevent the missile from striking the target, causing it to explode harmlessly in the water several hundred feet from the target. He has spent some time working out the details of the contrivance and he claims that it has not been perfected.
