

IMMIGRATION BILL BEING CONSIDERED.

Senator Leads Revolt Against Democratic Caucus to Bring up Immigration Bill

Washington, Aug. 21—An unexpected Democratic revolt in the Senate today resulted in the immigration bill being taken up in defiance of the Democratic caucus and opened the way for efforts to displace the revenue bill as unfinished business, an action which might indefinitely prolong the session of Congress.

Ten Democratic Senators voted with the solid Republican minority to take up the immigration bill upon motion of Senator Smith of South Carolina, chairman of the immigration committee. They were Ashurst, Beckham, Chamberlain, Gulberson, Harwick, Lane, Myers, Overman, Smith of South Carolina, and Vandaman.

Debate began on the measure immediately and proceeded until 2 o'clock when the revenue bill automatically came before the Senate. Senator Smith then moved to displace the revenue bill, provoking an all-afternoon discussion, which will be resumed when the Senate meets tomorrow.

Senator Stone, chairman of the foreign relations committee, was particularly aroused over the action of the revolvers. He charged them with treachery to the party in overturning the decision of the Democratic caucus to postpone action on the immigration bill until December.

Senator Stone's words aroused the fire of Senators Harwick and Smith of South Carolina.

"I promised my constituents that I would do all in my power to secure the passage of the immigration bill," said Senator Harwick, "and I propose to stand by that promise. My constituency is greater than the Democratic caucus."

Senator Smith insisted that the immigration bill never has been a partisan issue. "We should shut our doors," he said, "until we can Americanize the crowd we now have so that men on this floor might fight for the American flag without fearing half-baked foreigners, whose allegiance, in their hearts, is to another country."

Today's developments shut off debate on the revenue bill, but the Administration leaders hope to get it under way tomorrow.

Rowan County Safeguards the Public.

The Rowan County health board, which issued an order forbidding children under 15 from attending any public gathering, also passed this rule: "That all children under the age of 15 coming into the city of Salisbury from any section of the State or nation infected with infantile paralysis must have a doctor's certificate certifying that the child or children have not been exposed in any way to the disease."

Die Dye Plant Started in Mountain Town.

Hemlock, Aug. 21—The industrial maneuvers required to meet the exigencies of war times has resulted in an industry for the mountain community of Hemlock, under the most unusual circumstances. Capitalists organized under the name of the National Dye Corporation, purchased an ideal extract plant at Hemlock which is 13 miles from Shoun, Tenn., the nearest railway station, and a manufacturing dyes from tropical woods, imported from Central and South America in shiploads. These woods are brought from port by rail to Shoun, Tenn., and are hauled thence on wagons to Hemlock. Fifty mountain teams are kept busy with this task, and the dye products are hauled to the railroad on the return trips. S. H. Flynn, the manager, is said to have explained that this was the only idle plant of the kind his people could find, and the fact that they had a contract for quick deliveries resulted in their determination to try the mountain plant. Outside opinion is that probably the idea of being in the mountains and away from the path of foreign spies might have controlled in the adoption of this unusual plan of industry.

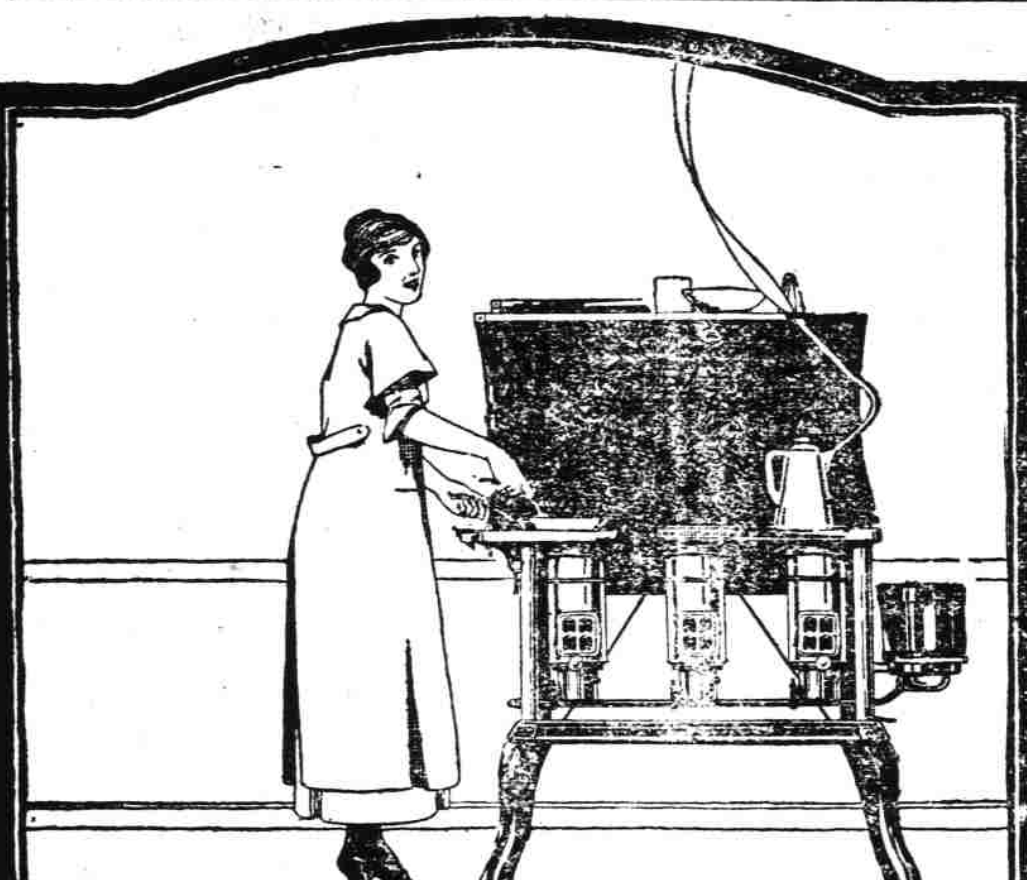
