The registration blanks for the selective conscription have been received by Sheriff Krider and the registrars have been appointed. The registration will take place at the usual voting places throughout the county and will be open for that purpose from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m. All males between the ages of 21 and 30 are expected to register. One year in prison is the penalty for failure to register.

Sunday afternoon a motorcycle driven by B J Yost and a heavy automobile driven by H C Kennerly collided at the corner of South Main and Bank Streets. Charlie Yost was riding on the rear of the motorcycle and jumped to avoid injury but was struck and run over by the auto, one leg being badly broken. He was taken to a doctor's office and later to the sanatorium. It is said Mr Kennerly failed to observe the custom of unloading the street before turning. Cases were brought in the county court by both parties but both were found not guilty and the cases dismissed. It is probably that Mr Yost will bring a suit for damages.

Felix Peck of Gold Hill, carried off the honors in the orator's medal contest at Catawba College Friday. Banks Peeler of Granite Quarry was second. The many friends of D A Atwell will regret to learn that he suffered a stroke of paralysis several days ago and is critically ill.

Roy Sigmond of Spencer, brakeman on the Yadkin railroad, was caught between some cars at Granite Quarry Saturday afternoon and right seriously mashed. He was brought to Salisbury and taken to the sanatorium, where he is said to be improving.

The annual tournament of the North Carolina firemen which was to have been held in Asheville next July, has been postponed one year.

Wesley Earnhardt, who has had a contract with the State to drag and keep in order the public highway from the toll bridge to Salisbury and thence to the Irredell line, has been notified that the state, owing to the war conditions, had decided to discontinue this work.

Mart P Moore, dredging contractor of this city, had the misfortune to lose a dredge boat near Monroe, Ga., by fire Sunday. If the outfit was totally destroyed the loss is estimated at 14,000.

COUNTY APPROPRIATES \$1,000 FOR ROADS.

Meets Requirement in Order to Participate in Federal Highway Money Will Get \$10,000

At a call meeting of the board of county commissioners, held Thursday and at which all members were present, the following business was transacted:

It was ordered that C M Hendel be given an order for two car loads of Virginia coal at \$6 00 per ton.

Chairman Hall and Superintendent Thomason were appointed to confer with T H Knox relative to sidewalk and hedge.

Register of Deeds J C Deaton was authorized to go to Morganton to see what could be done regarding the application of the county for admission of Mrs. Victor Hodge to the State hospital. Mr. Deaton was in Morganton Friday and succeeded in having the application favorably passed on.

Campbell's bridge across the Yadkin river was ordered repaired.

The sum of \$1,000 was appropriated to the State Highway Commission, this being ten per cent. of the amount to be apportioned for this county of \$11,000, as the \$1,000 will be refunded to the county by the State Highway Commission.

Application was made to the board for the use of the old court house auditorium for a concert by the orphan class from Oxford orphanage and this was cheerfully granted.

It was ordered that in place of using the change of road as reported by the committee, from near J K Goodman's barn through Mt. Ulla, that said road be used as it now is, crossing the railroad at the roller mill and again beyond the station. This action was taken on account of the stringent financial condition of the county.

It was ordered that Messrs. Hall, Fleming, Gray and County Auditor Neave meet with the county attorney, Kerr Craige, Esq., to fix the tax rate for 1917.

It was agreed that two pigs be purchased for each of the county camps to be fed on refuse from the camp kitchens and when killed the meat be sold and proceeds turned into the county treasury.

On account of the financial condition of the county it was decided to defer the Rench's ford bridge matter.

Jerusalem township, Davie county, has just voted a \$25,000 bond issue with which to improve roads. It is said the road leading to South River is to be improved.
