Her remains were brought to Salisbury and the funeral was held from the home of a brother, W. E. Shuping, being conducted by Rev. W. A. Lambeth and Rev. E. P. Rowlett. The interment was in Chestnut Hill.

Prof Chas. W. Rankin of Graham N. C., aged 32, died in Asheville, last Friday, where he had gone for treatment. The remains were taken to China Grove Sunday morning and the funeral was held from St. Marks E. L. Church Monday afternoon. Rev. W. H. Riser, former pastor of that church, officiating, and Rev. C. P. Fisher, present pastor, assisting. The interment was in Green Lawn Cemetery. He leaves a wife and two small boys, also a father, mother, two brothers and one sister. He was a native of this county and his parents live near Barber. 25 or 30 former patrons and teachers of Graham and some from Concord and Salisbury were present at the funeral, which was one of the largest ever held from St. Marks. Mr Rankin was a splendid young man in every respect and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. He married Miss Lurline Graham of China Grove about five years ago.

Clarence Calvin, the infant son of David Barringer of Providence township, died at the home of his parents Thursday night and the funeral and interment took place at Providence church, Rev. Kirk officiating.

The many friends of Mr and Mrs D. Oestreich will regret to learn of the death of their son, Wallace, which occurred last Thursday morning from the effects of inflammatory rheumatism.
