Wolf's Comet Visible.

The observation of Wolf's periodic comet by Prof. Barrard at Yerkes observation is announced by Edward C Pickering, director of the Harvard observatory. The comet has a period of close to seven years, and is permanently attached to the solar system. It was first seen in 1884. The announcement states that its magnitude on this visit is 14.5.
