### Food Crop Increase Shows Great Gain

Since 1929, North Carolina farmers have increased the acreage to food and feed crops by the remarkable total of 695,000 acres. During the same period, the acreage to cotton and tobacco has been decreased by 576,000 acres and allowing for an increase of 19,000 acres in the peanut crop, the total decrease in the State's so-called cash crops amounts to 557,-
