business negotiation since the depression set in.

They classed the conference as a history making event, first, because of its far-reaching effects upon business, and second, because it was the first time that labor and capital ever have sat down across a table to settle amicably their differences upon so huge a scale.

The lowered wages are expected to have a considerable immediate effect for the better upon security prices.

The union delegates put out several feelers to see whether the roads might accept a smaller wage reduction and whether they would make more definite assurances of work for the 500,000 railroad workers now jobless. When no such assurances were forthcoming, labor made its momentous decision. The union leaders then accepted the wage reductions at a meeting with the railroad presidents.
