

Builders Study \$3,000,000 Financing Plan

OFFER ADVANCES ON PAPERS HELD BY LUMBER FIRMS

Proposition Will Be Submitted To Carolina Retail Dealers Association In Near Future For Acceptance.

A plan whereby a southern financing corporation will advance Carolina lumber and building material dealers money up to \$3,000,000 on their customers' paper has been submitted and will probably be accepted by the Carolina Retail Lumber Dealers' association, Victor W. Wheeler, executive secretary of the body, announced.

A meeting of the board of directors will be held within the next two weeks to consider this proposal and take up other activities planned for the organization in the coming year.

While finance corporations have taken over automobile paper, furniture paper, and other notes, the plan to take over paper for lumber dealers and building material men in the Carolinas is something new, he said.

If directors of the organization decide to accept the proposal, there should be a decided increase in this business in the two states, he declared.

The various activities outlined for the new year include putting the association in a stronger financial position, Mr. Wheeler said. Another major activity will be the stressing of development of district groups with the idea that more beneficial work can be done in smaller groups. With the development of these groups, one-day meetings will be held in each quarter, and it is expected that more can be accomplished than has been possible in the past.

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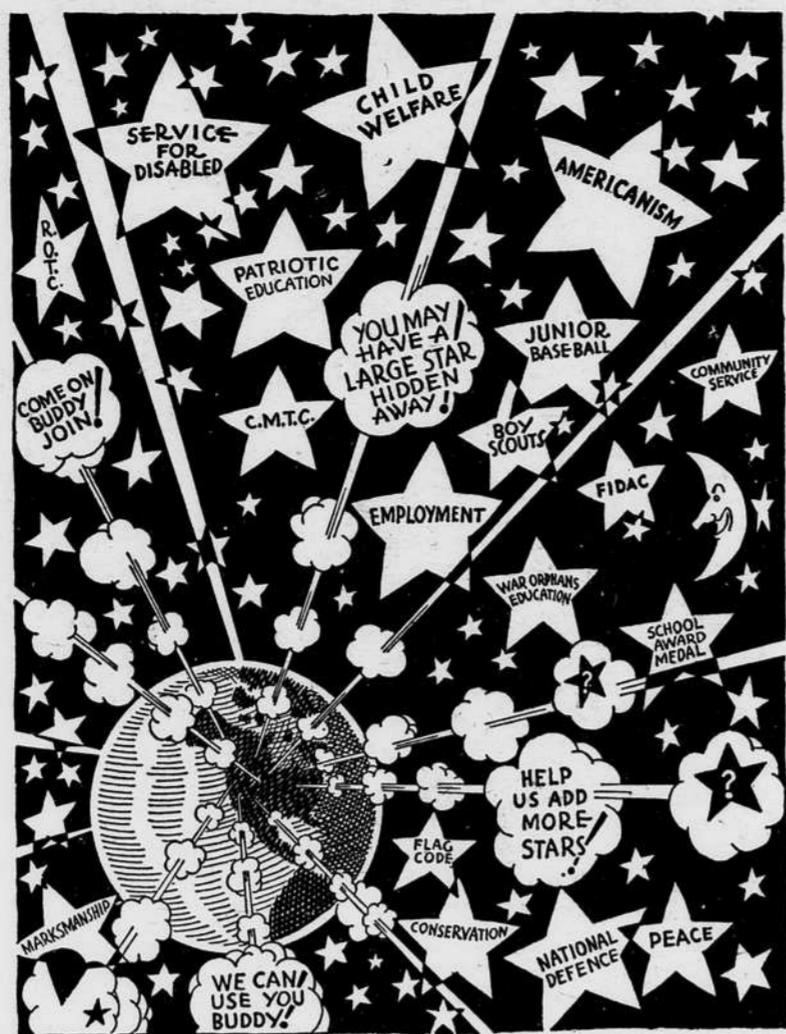
