

Mills Forced To Buy Cotton From Other States Because Most Of Our Staple Is Unsuitable.

At present, North Carolina is the largest cotton consuming state in the union. The annual consumption amounts to approximately a million and a half bales. The state produces from three-fourths of a million to one million bales a year, and in spite of the fact that the North Carolina mills use more than this amount each year, approximately 43 per cent of the cotton

entailing an additional transportation expense. To obtain the remainder of their requirements, the mills purchase cotton in practically every state that grows cotton and some from foreign coun-

tries. Some may blame the mills for using cotton from other areas, but we cannot expect them to buy cotton which does not meet their requirements. Early investigators in the stae, 15 or 20 years ago, found considerable lack of co-operaion on the part of mills, and actually some hostility, but today we find a splendid spirit of co-operation on the part of the textile mills. They express a willingness to use cotton if we will only produce the kind they can economically use.
