Employment In U. S. Continues To Show Gain

Expansion Seen In Coal Mining And Textile Operations; Work For Farm Hands

Improved Conditions Of Previous Three Months Maintained During October

Further increases in several major industries and maintenance of improved employment conditions of the previous three months were reported in the monthly review of the United States employment ser-

The service pointed to expansion in coal mining and a decided improvement in textile mill operations as among the factors leading to a feeling of encouragement.

"A digest of the industrial employment reports of the various states received by the United States employment service for October," said the announcement, reveals that the improvement in employment which obtained during the preceding three months was well maintained. An encouraging feature was the further increase to forces that occurred in several of the major industries.

"Coal mining expanded in both the anthracite and bituminous fields, additional mines were reopened and many mine workers were recalled. Activities in connection with metalliferous mining, except that of gold, continued on a subnormal basis.

"A decided improvement was made in the textile mills producing knit goods, shirts, worsted hosiery, woolen and cotton goods and rayon. Many of these factories reported an increase in the forces engaged and in several instances departmental overtime prevailed.


