

Curb On Temper Means Success

If you are a young girl with a desire to embark upon a career, that of an actress, a writer, a journalist, a designer of stage sets or costumes, don't go to school for it, go to work for it. In other words, don't use up father's hard earned dollars, if they are hard earned and you are very serious, spending it in school.

Take any kind of a job within the field and work from 7 and if you stick to it long enough, you may grow famous and moderately wealthy.

This is the old-fashioned advice of the very modern-minded Aline Bernstein, one of America's foremost designers of stage sets.

Miss Bernstein, a charming, soft spoken woman, whose appearance belies the 50 years she insists is her age, said that she never went to a school to learn her work and wonders how it could be taught in any school. Yet she said that each year countless girls come to her and announce that they are designers of stage sets, having learned their craft at school. Some of these girls she has given a chance in her studio, but she finds that they do not work out well in practice.

"There are certain things that schools cannot teach. They cannot teach one how to get along with people, and in my field the ability to get along with people, to get things done, is all important. I have disciplined myself never to lose my temper. As my work depends upon working with others, to give away to temper would be quite fatal. It is such a complicated craft."

"One must be able to do a little carpentry, to know something about the job of electrician. Sitting before a drawing board and designing a pretty picture for a set is the very smallest part of the job, I assure you."

"For an example, when I was designing the sets for 'Grand Hotel,' it involved some highly technical work in construction. I was obliged to work with the carpenter and show him part of the set could be built according to my designs." She said that the great Gordon Craig was once commissioned to design sets for the "Hamlet" production of the Moscow Art Theatre. When the sets were built according to his designs, they never could be used. They were too heavy and impractical for use on any stage.

"I had to work everything out for myself right in the theatre in a practical way. When you are spending other people's money, there is a tremendous responsibility involved. The year I designed the sets for 'Grand Hotel,' I was instructed with \$115,000 in various productions for sets. And, one must work quickly, effectively and economically. One could go to school many years, but working in the theatre is worth all the years of theoretical study."

Michigan Voters Give Democrats Huge Majorities

According to the Detroit News "Michigan's voters have responded to the Democratic exhortation, 'Finish the job!' by putting nine more Democrats in State office. Returns from Monday's election early withered the Republican hope that the disastrous tidal wave of last November had receded. The men and women of Michigan vividly demonstrated their continuing belief that affairs at Lansing should be placed in new hands."

Detroit and Wayne County were overwhelmingly Democratic, as in November. The remainder of Michigan, far from saving the day for the Republicans, added to their discomfiture. Every Republican on the State ticket was beaten decisively.

The Democrats elected both their candidates for the Supreme Court; both Regents of the University, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Member of State School Board, both members of the State Board of Agriculture, the State Highway Commissioner. Moreover, the Democrats made a clean sweep of the Detroit elective offices, including both Judges of the Court of Common Pleas.

With the November elections held in conjunction with those held last Monday, Michigan is about as completely Democratic as the "Solid South." The Democratic majorities last Monday were in excess of 100,000.

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

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
