

# Relief Garden Program Gets A Good Start

## Is Under Way All Over State

About 130,000 Relief Families In N. C. To Work Gardens—Community Projects Too

Municipal and industrial gardens, where a person on the relief rolls may have a plot of his own, and a promise of returns in produce proportional to the amount of work he does in the garden, is the primary aim of the governor's office of relief in promoting its subsistence gardening program throughout the state.

Then, too, it is thought that the individual garden program will tend to improve the morale and will give an outlet in the form of wholesome activity and a feeling of self-reliance. Approximately 130,000 relief families in North Carolina will grow individual gardens this year and the planting is now well under way.

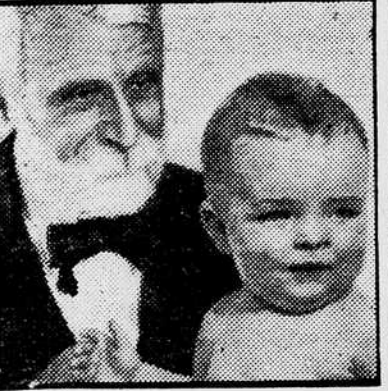
There are families living in towns and cities, however, where the individual garden cannot be had and for these groups, community farm gardens, cultivated as a unit and ranging in size of from 5 to 300 acres are now being planted in more than 50 towns and cities of the state. This type of farm garden operates as a work relief project and will produce a large supply of foods which will be conserved for fall and winter distribution to the needy by the relief organizations of the state.

Provisions have been made through the Reconstruction Finance corporation, in charge of the unemployment relief division, to allocate some of its funds for the purchasing of standard garden seed packages.

It is not the intent that garden seed may be distributed free to all citizens but only to families receiving relief. A garden calendar has been prepared by the state college extension service and the governor's office of relief has had 130,000 copies printed. These calendars are now in the hands of the relief families and lists the desirable and suitable varieties of vegetables as well as tells when to plant and how much of each vegetable to plant for a family of five.

Each county is organized by townships or communities and all towns and cities are organized by wards or sections. A capable supervisor, who is an unemployed person, is in charge. His workers first make a survey of the relief families in the area to determine the number of families who have suitable plots for gardens. All available fertile, vacant lots are also secured for gardening purposes. Each garden plot is measured to determine the exact size so that no seeds will be wasted.

A survey is then made of the community to locate available manures from stalls and pig pens so that gardens may be adequately

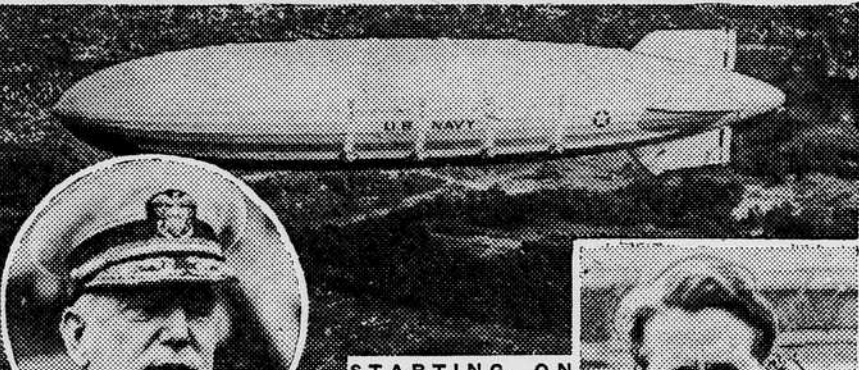

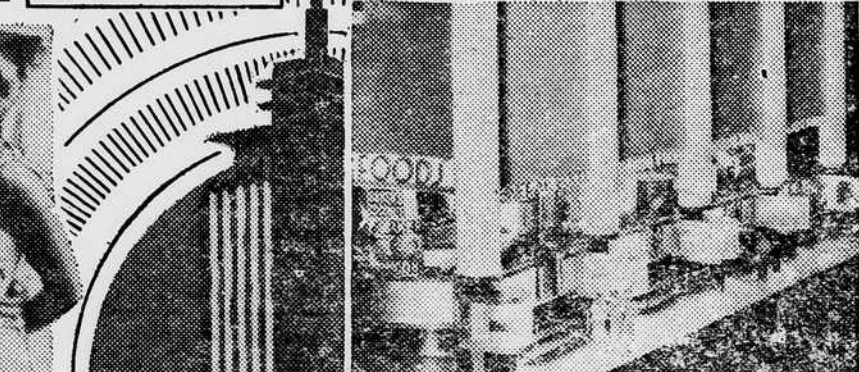

fertilized. The plots are then either spaded or plowed and prepared for planting. When this is done the seeds are supplied and planting is done. A limited amount of commercial fertilizer is purchased where needed. In many communities planting demonstrations have been conducted by county agents and teachers of agriculture. At some of the demonstrations more than a hundred men have attended to observe the correct methods to use in planting their gardens.

The gardening work is not optional on the part of the relief family, but is required of every family who can secure land for planting a subsistence garden.
