

Carolina Host to Virginia For Thanksgiving Classic

Chapel Hill—Carolina and Virginia football teams will clash here Thanksgiving Day in the 38th renewal of the South's oldest and most colorful Turkey Day classic. Virginia held the upper hand in the early years of the rivalry but Carolina has taken the lead since the War. The total series shows Virginia 21 wins, Carolina 13 wins, and three ties.

One of the highlights was the 14-13 Carolina victory of 1927, which marked the dedication of Kenan Stadium, and which drew a crowd of 28,000 the largest ever to see a football game in this State.

Heavy advance sale of tickets indicates a crowd of near 25,000 this year, and athletic authorities are making extensive preparations to handle the throng of people with dispatch and maximum comfort.

Extra parking fields are being put in order. The force of attendants at the stadium will virtually be doubled. Additional police will

be secured from nearby cities to help the state highway patrolmen handle parking and traffic. And the local people and merchants are cooperating in arranging extra service on meals and refreshments.

Additional features will be the reunions of Carolina's great eleven of 1922 and 1929, the Thanksgiving dances of the German Club, and the attendant reunion festivities for Carolina's homecoming alumni.

Virginia won last year's game 14-7 and Carolina the 1931 game 13-7. The customary fine game and tough scrap is expected this year. Carolina rules a slight favorite because of its vast improvement in recent games. But Virginia looked mighty strong against Columbia and Navy.

Carolina will have ten days instead of three in which to get ready for this year's game and will be led into battle by Captain Bill Croom, who ran 75 yards for their

First prize in the state-wide canning contest, brought to a close by the judging of products at State College last week, has been awarded to Mrs. S. W. Dixon of Alamance County. A cash prize of \$20 was given Mrs. Dixon along with the blue ribbon.

"We were greatly impressed with the quality of canned material submitted in this state-wide contest," says Mrs. Cornelia C. Morris, district home agent and food conservation specialist at the College. "Each woman enrolled in the home demonstration clubs of North Carolina was eligible to enter. Each contestant had to submit three jars, one of canned berries, one of canned fruit other than berries and one of canned vegetables. These were judged at the county achievement days and the first prize winners in the various counties were entered into the State contest. Winnings were made by women in 12 counties."

Perry of Franklin, \$3; ninth, Mrs. C. E. McDaniel of Cumberland, \$3; tenth, Mrs. B. Powell of Edgecombe, \$3; eleventh Mrs. T. M. Royster of Gaston, \$3 and twelfth, Mrs. L. A. Bowers of Mecklenburg, \$3.

Duke And State To Have Annual Clash on Saturday

Durham, N. C.—Duke's Blue Devils, the greatest team in the history of the local institution and recognized by many as the finest gridiron team ever produced in this state, will be making their final appearance in North Carolina this season when they meet N. C. State in Duke Stadium Saturday.

For championships, it will be the crucial contest for the Blue Devils. A victory would assure them of both the Southern conference and the North Carolina Big Five crowns in which races they have won three games thus far this season.

The Blue Devils, listed now with the outstanding three teams in the Nation and rated a chance for mythical national honors, play their final game of the season against Georgia Tech in Atlanta, December 2.

Saturday's battle should be a great one. State has had the habit for the past two years of offering its very best game against the Blue Devils and this year is not expected to be an exception. With two weeks to prepare for the game, the Wolfpack should be at top form and, after watching Duke beat Carolina last week, they know what to look for when the Blue Devils start running them.

The fullback battle that will be offered between Ray Rex and Bob Cox of Duke should be one of the greatest exhibitions of line plunging ever seen in this state. Both have been gaining ground through opposing forward walls all season and will get their first chance to vie for honors in this game.

There will be other individual battles that are expected to bring fire. Steve Sabol of N. C. State and E. B. Dunlap of Duke will have a personal affair at center and Bob McQuage of the Wolves and Harry Rossiter and Nick Laney of the Blue Devils will offer a great punting duel.

Five Years Given Reynolds Plotter
