

Dorris Duke Gets \$10,000,000, Only Third Of Estate

Dorris, Duke, tall, slender, blonde daughter of the late James B. Duke, celebrated her 21st birthday recently.

For this young lady, who has been pictured publicly as "America's richest girl," it meant far less of wealth and luxury than it means the coming of responsibility.

Under the provisions of her father's will, this is what the day brought to Dorris:

She comes into possession in her own right of property worth an

unestimated number of millions of dollars, made up of one-third of a one-third share in the residue of the estate her father left when he died in 1924. Perhaps a guess at the amount Dorris receives is made at \$10,000,000.

She becomes a trustee of the Duke Endowment, which, by her father's will and by trusts he set up prior to his death, handles the bulk of the tremendous Duke fortune, entirely for charitable purposes.

When Dorris is 25, she will receive another third of her one-third share in her father's residuary estate, and at the age of 30 the final third will come to her.

Freddie Crawford of Duke and Jack Phillips of Tech, both hailing from the little town of Waynesville, played together throughout high and prep school, and for the first time Saturday they will be foes. They are the two big stars of their respective teams.

Tech has been the "hard luck" team of the south this season. Statistically they have outplayed every team they have met this season but due to many breaks of the game have suffered defeat several times. In this, their final game of the season, they should be at top strength.

The Blue Devils will invade Atlanta wearing the crown of both the Southern conference and the North Carolina Big Five. They clinched those honors with the victory over State, with a record of four wins and no losses in each championship campaign.
