

## Keep Turkey List To Promote Sales

The value of co-operative marketing has been demonstrated by Mrs. Rosalind A. Redfern, Anson county home demonstration agent, who has been helping farmers and farm women of the county to sell their turkeys.

She keeps in close touch with a number of large markets and with the various farmers who have birds for sale. When a large order comes in, she notifies the farmers in her territory and they co-operate in filling the order.

When the orders are scarce she helps the farmers find other markets for their turkeys. Certain days are designated as turkey day, when the growers bring the birds to a central point to be inspected, graded, and shipped to various buyers.

The largest shipping day in December was the 19th, when 700 turkeys weighing 8,893 pounds dressed were sent off. Two days later the same buyer asked for 150 more birds and agreed to send a truck around to the different homes and collect the birds alive, as the time was too limited to wait for the farmers to pluck the birds and take them to a central shipping point.

"If we had not established our plan of listing growers and the number of their birds for sale," she said, "we could not take advantage of these fine orders."

## Atlanta Ready To Wear Mart Opens Soon

Formation of a merchandise mart in Atlanta to serve ready-to-wear merchants of the Southeastern States has been announced by a group of southeastern business men and their associates, headed by W. R. C. Smith, former president of the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce.

The mart will be a buying center for merchants throughout the Southeast and will display merchandise from northern and eastern manufacturers at the same time like merchandise is displayed in New York, thus saving buyers a journey to New York.

Ira A. Stone, Charlotte textile manufacturer, is president, and E. P. Minogue, Charlotte, is vice president and general manager. Mr. Minogue, formerly assistant district manager for the Department of Commerce at Charlotte.

The Southeastern Merchandise Market, an institution of vital interest to the ready-to-wear stores of the Southeast, is to open on January 29th, in Atlanta, Georgia.

The market will contain perhaps the most comprehensive display of ready-to-wear, textiles and hosiery ever assembled in the Southeast, and will take over the selling problems of a representative group of northern and southern manufacturers.

Mr. Smith laid particular emphasis on the fact that the Southeastern Merchandise Market is being established for the benefit of Southern Merchants and urges their attendance at its initial opening on January 29.
