 that was in the beginning.
 Nobody but Democrats were supposed or expected to be in sympathy with the New Deal at the start. But with the opposition fading throughout the country and party lines being almost entirely obliterated everywhere, Mr. Roosevelt apparently has come to the sound conclusion that the party test would keep out of the public service a great many able men who, as it now appears, are not at all likely to throw monkey-wrenches into the machinery if they are called in to help run it.
 Naturally, the President wants among those closest to him and charged with the chief responsibility for carrying out his policies, only men whose sympathies with his before they became potential office-holders. But there is likely to be less barring of good men from subordinate positions simply because they didn't believe in the New Deal before they saw it beginning to work out.

Where the New Deal is heading is being disclosed more easily from day to day. "Joe" Eastman's program for the nationalization of the entire railroad system was hardly a bombshell, for the Federal Coordinator of Railroads has long been known as advocate of Government ownership. What was surprising about the plan which he submitted to the President and Congress was not only his well-considered statement that the time is not yet ripe for financing his play, so it was merely offered as something to think about for a year or two, but also the provisions which he said were vital, making political control and operation of the roads if and when the Government takes them over, impossible.

The Eastman plan, which is going to get more serious consideration than any other railroad plan yet discussed, would swap Government bonds for all railroad securities, set up a control board of railroad men to run them, and eliminate all private interests, including the names of existing systems. Folks would no longer travel on the Burlington or the Santa Fe but on the National Railways.
