

Testifies He Got \$10 Fee For Murder

Wilmington—The state rested after Ben Johnson, negro, indicted at the last term of New Hanover superior court for the murder of Carl Hayduck, 26, Castle Hayne farmer, took the stand and testified that Faison Gore, on trial as accessory to the murder, made him drunk on corn whiskey and gave him \$10 for "knocking off" Hayduck. Johnson, the first witness called, is not on trial.

Leaning forward from the witness stand, he rested one arm on his knee and the other on the rail before him. "I was drunk," he said, "drunk as a fool. I didn't know nothing to do 'cept what he (indicating Gore with a vague gesture) told me to do."

He had testified that he, Jack Mazur, Gore and Mrs. Gore and Hayduck had been drinking together. He said the Gore's forced him to drink two "tea" glasses full of corn whiskey.

Gore, he testified, asked him repeatedly to "knock off" Hayduck because, he quoted Gore as saying, Hayduck was going with Mrs. Gore and had been stealing and selling his whiskey. He said Gore gave Hayduck \$10 and told him, "knock him off," get the money and give it back to me."

He said he used a heavy oak stick to hit Hayduck as he was on his knees repairing an automobile headlight. He told of drunkenly falling and getting up, only to fall again, as he tried to make his way northward along Route 40, after having placed Hayduck's body behind a chicken coop.

Hayduck died of a fractured skull after being found behind the chicken coop in the rear of Jake Mazur's home.

The coroner's jury, after hearing Mrs. Gore quoted as saying over and over, "I love! Karl better than anything," ordered her held as a material witness.

U. N. C. Awards Diplomas To 368 Seniors

Chapel Hill.—Another scholastic year came to a close at the University of North Carolina Wednesday with the awarding of degrees to 368 seniors at final graduating exercises held in Memorial hall Tuesday night.

The commencement address was made by Harry L. Hopkins, federal emergency relief administrator, who visualized a long-time program for the relief of unemployed through various projects and unemployment insurance.

Hopkins predicted that after "normalcy" is restored, about 5,000,000 person now receiving some part of their livelihood from relief funds would remain unemployed instead of the mere 3,000,000 who were unemployed in 1929.

This increase in unemployment, he said, would result from mechanical inventions. He estimated that 16,000,000 persons in the United States, one out of every seven—is now receiving some part of their livelihood from public relief funds.

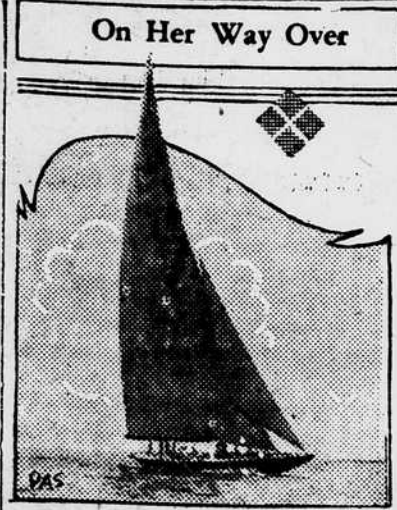

North Carolina Bonds Sold At New Low Rate

Raleigh.—The state of North Carolina sold \$12,230,000 worth of bonds Wednesday at an average of 3.76 per cent, the lowest interest rate at which the state's bonds have ever been sold. Of this amount, \$5,530,000 were sold at 3 1-2 per cent and \$6,700,000 at 1-2 per cent.

Back when the credit of North Carolina was regarded as being at its best, and when A. W. McLean was governor, the best prices ever received for North Carolina bonds was 4 per cent, it is being recalled here. As a result, these prices are regarded as being a decided tribute to the fiscal stability of the state and the management of Governor J. C. B. Ehringhaus and State Treasurer Charles M. Johnson, in securing a balanced budget from the 1933 general assembly. At that time the state was paying 6 per cent interest on its short term notes was doing well to get that and could not have sold a bond at any price.

But ever since the 1933 general assembly balanced the budget and assured to pay its debts as they came due and also pay operating expenses, the interest rate has dropped steadily until today North Carolina's credit is probably as good if not better than most other states.

2,350 Youths To Be Enlisted In The Marines

After a long period, when but few applicants were enlisted, the U. S. Marine Corps has started to accept 2350 youths.

The provisions of a recent act of Congress increased the strength of the Marine Corps from 1500 to 16000. This will leave it still 1500 below the strength three years ago. The remainder will be required to fill the places left vacant by discharges and other causes according to Lieut. Col. A. B. Drum, Officer in Charge, Marine Recruiting Office, Post Office Building, Savannah, Ga.

With a view of obtaining the best men, only those who have graduated from high school will be accepted. Parents consent for those who have not reached their majority and character reference are required.

Applicants are immediately sent to the Marine Base, Parris Island, S. C., upon enlistment, after which they are transferred to Posts or Ships where needed. Travel, adventure, sports and free education comprise some of the features offered.

Young men in this vicinity who are graduates of high school and desire service in the Marine Corps should write the Savannah office for application.

National Forests In East Are Asked

Raleigh.—Establishment of at least two national forests in eastern North Carolina, in addition to the Croatan area recently authorized in Craven, Jones and Carteret counties to complete the system in that section is being urged upon the federal government of conservation and development, R. Bruce Etheridge, director, announced.

The conservation department for a number of years has consistently advocated the establishment of a line lands of eastern North Carolina, and at various intervals has suggested specific tracts in all sections of the coastal plains, Etheridge pointed out.
