Rival Pastors To Take Turns Leading Flock

In a Solomonian judgment here Judge A. M. Stack in superior court temporarily settled a dispute of members of the Elizabeth Temple of Concord, International Four-Square Gospel Association, Incorporated, by allowing two pastors to alternate in holding services until the case can be settled by a judge and jury in Cabarrus county.

Rev. Mrs. Willie Laurel Olive, founder and former pastor, and her sister, Daisy Louise Brown, recently secured a temporary injunction against Rev. Walter J. Pollard, pastor, and George W. Funderburk, J. B. Lewis and W. T. Blackwelder, trustees, restraining them from having any participation in the activities of the church until the matter was heard before him.

The plaintiffs contended that the defendants were ousted as church officials and members of the congregation at a meeting in Spartanburg, S. C., on October 21 by the presbytery of the general council. The defendants, however, insisted that this body had no authority to eject them.

Planting Tree Seedlings Soon

High Point.—Reforestation of 1500 acres of submarginal, or unutilizable, and in the Deep River and Brown Creek erosion control areas, with the planting of 1,500,000 commercial tree seedlings will begin prior to December 1, according to Charles H. Flory, chief forester of the Soil Erosion Service of the United States Department of the Interior.

The reforestation activity is in line with the modified land-use program being sponsored by the Soil Erosion Service in the two watersheds. Seriously eroded land and worn-out fields will be provided with a forest cover to protect them against further erosion, Mr. Flory stated.

Of the million-and-a-half seedlings required, 600,000 will be furnished jointly by the state forest nursery at Clayton and by the government's erosion control nursery at Statesville. The remaining 900,000 will be obtained from other sources.

About 200 men will be needed to carry out the planting program. Most of these will be supplied by CCC labor in the two areas. Planting will continue from December 1 to April 1.

There will be 675,000 pine seedlings of the shortleaf, longleaf, white and loblolly types, and 510,000 black locust, 100,000 yellow poplar, 63,000 black walnut and 50,000 white oak. The remainder will include cedar, catalpa, hackberry, ash, honey locust and cypress.

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
