ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING TOWN OF SPENCER TO ISSUE \$27,000 SEWER BONDS

Section 1. That the Town of Spencer issue its bonds pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$27,000, for the purpose of making improvements to the Town's sewer system.

Section 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. That a statement of the debt of the Town has been filed with the Town Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. That this Ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under said Act and that in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the Town at an election as provided in said Act.

The foregoing Ordinance was passed on the 8th day of March, 1935, and was first published on the fifth day of April, 1935. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said Ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
