Also says no probability of Johnson, who failed to arrest Sherman on fortified mountains and strongholds will be able to detain him long before the town in an open country, accessible to the approach on all sides.

Says the danger is Johnston will give up the place in dispair, destroying such of his ammunition and supplies as cannot be removed, and retreat farther to the South east, in direction of Augusta or Savannah.
