REPORTS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.

[We are indebted to the politeness of Lieutenant General Taylor for the copy of the following dispatch. -Eds. R. & A.]

CHEROKEE, Oct. 10.—Generals Rosseau and Thomas are following me with about 12,000 men, and attempting to cross below here.

I have still 500 men on the North side of the river, who have gone to the hills. I think them safe.

Three gunboats and four transports came up the river, to day, as far as Eastport, and landed 2,000 men and three pieces of artillery.

Lieut. Col. Kelley, with Forrest's old regiment and the 12th Tennessee, attacked and drove them back, capturing the three pieces of artillery and horses, and setting one transport on fire.

Washington is reported in command of the river expedition. I am moving my command to...

FROM LOUISIANA. CLINTON, La., Oct. 17.—On Friday night our scouts burned 800 bales of cotton in sight of Baton Rouge.

FROM RICHMOND. RICHMOND, Oct. 17th.—The following official dispatch has been received at the War Department:

Hon. Jas. A. Seddon, Secretary of War: On the 14th Col. Mosby struck the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad at Duffields, and destroyed the United States mail train, consisting of a locomotive and ten cars, securing twenty prisoners and 150 horses.

MARYLAND. MARYLAND gives 3,000 home majority against the constitution. The Herald says that Mosby got over \$200,000 in greenbacks at Duffields Station.

FROM PETERSBURG. PETERSBURG, Oct. 17th.—No military movements or operations transpiring in this department, and no indications of any since Grant got into position before the city.

PETERSBURG, Oct. 17.—Chronicle of the 15th says, Pennsylvania admitted gone Democratic, even with soldiers votes. Maryland voted against new Constitution 3000 majority, though soldiers vote will adopt it.

Indiana and Ohio gone Republican. Dispatches from Grant's army before this place say active operations will soon be renewed. Papers say Mosby made a

raid on B. & O. R. R. and Manassas Gap R. R. at White Plains, in both of which he was successful. Price at Boonville met Shelby in North Missouri, pillaging and conspiring.

MOBILE, Oct. 17.—A special dispatch to the Register, via Senatobia 18th, says the St. Louis Republican of the 11th & 12th, says Price retired without attacking Jefferson City, and went westward to the neighborhood of Boonsville.

MEMPHIS. Memphis Argus of the 15th has later dates, which confirms the destruction of Gastouade, Osage and more bridges. Bill Anderson, Threlkill, Perkins and Thornton, all joined Price, who has 1500 cavalry and 19 pieces of artillery.

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Oct. 18.—In the affair at Fisher's Hill on Thursday, we killed and wounded from fifty to seventy-five of the enemy, and took many prisoners.

MOBILE, Oct. 18.—A special dispatch to the Advertiser via Senatobia 17th says the Memphis Bulletin of the 18th claim 40,000 majority for the Republicans in Ohio.

CHIEF JUSTICE TANEY died on the 12th. Chase is spoken of as his successor. Nothing from Grant, Sherman, Sheridan or Missouri.

THE YANKEES have admitted their defeat at East Port, by Forrest.
