5,332 Shares of stock in the Columbia and Hamburg Railroad were sold at auction in Augusta, week before last, at \$49 and \$50 per share of \$25. The road is now in progress of construction.

NEGROES.—At a sale of Negroes in Charleston last week, the following prices were obtained: \$8000 for a woman 22 years old, cook and washer; \$6000 for a house girl, 17 years; \$5,200 for a girl 16 yrs.; \$8000 for a woman 28 yrs., and two children 7 and 8; \$6,000 for a boy 19 yrs., field hand; \$5,150 for a boy 18 yrs., field hand; \$3,600 for a man 40 yrs., field hand.

At the same sale 8 per cent Confederate Bonds, long dates, sold at par.

The Conscription in Alabama.—We find some interesting statistics in the consolidated return of the registration law of Alabama, just completed under orders of the Conscription Bureau. It appears that there are in that State, 14,200 men who are fit for duty who are not in the field. There are, besides these, 4,497 who are physically disabled, and who we leave out of the statistics altogether. Of those who are fit for the field, there are 5,099 exempted by law of Congress, including 1,164 State officers, 1,315 overseers and agriculturists, 585 ministers, 684 physicians, 291 school teachers, 163 newspaper and 445 railroad employees, and a few others. The detailed men in the State number 2,547, and those in government service 2,794; and in addition to these, there is a list of "miscellaneous" details or exemptions, numbering 971, in which we find that 492 men are put down as "unclassified." The consolidated report, from which this abstract is taken, has some other miscellaneous items, such as "reported deserters," "men lying in the woods," &c., increasing the grand total, including the physically disabled, to 20,256.

None of these statistics have reference to the reserve forces, and only refer to the men between 18 and 45 who were called out by the act passed two years ago by Congress.

RUMORS.

A report is prevalent in this city, that the Yankees have burnt Plymouth and evacuated the place. Persons who are reported to have had conversations with the enemy, say that their object in visiting Plymouth was to destroy the Albemarles, and thus relieve for other duty the fleet below that had been stationed there to watch our Iron-clads.

Another report is, that Grant intends establishing his Headquarters at Norfolk with a view to extensive operations in the counties of Eastern North Carolina. And in this connection, we see it stated in the Petersburg Express, that intelligence received from below that city, gives us the impression of the people in Suffolk and vicinity, that Grant intends to establish winter quarters for the greater part of his army in that country. But the Express discredits the truth of the statement, as it says Grant cannot afford to withdraw the larger portion of his lines from around Petersburg, without risking the safety of the remaining portion, as well as the security of his strong positions.

We give the reports as we heard them, without knowing any thing

of their truthfulness. We are inclined to credit the report of the burning and evacuation of Plymouth, and as to Grant's movements, we are content to leave them to the watchful care of General Lee.

Raleigh Conservative.

The Raleigh Conservative of the 9th inst. says: The Second Class of Home Guards has been called out to relieve the first class whose time will expire in a few days. The following is the order.

Special Orders, No. 137.

I. Commanding Officers of the several Regiments and Battalions of the Guard for Home Defence will at once call out for field service the second class of their respective commands as organized under General Orders No. 24, arm and equip them as far as practicable and send them, with

out delay, to Goldsboro, with instructions to report to Brig. Gen. C. Leavenworth.

Those persons who were drawn with the first class, but failed to report for duty with that class, will be ordered with the second class to Goldsboro. Commanders will at the same time, send to Goldsboro for examination by a Board of Surgeons all persons of the first class claiming exemption on account of physical disability, but who do not hold certificates of disability approved by the Surgeon General and Adjutant General, or exemptions of certificates of disability from the State Examining Boards. In case any one is physically unable to proceed to Goldsboro to appear before the Board, he will be examined by the Medical Officer of the Battalion who will send to the Surgeon General a certificate of honor, describing his case. They will likewise send to Goldsboro all men and musket accoutrements in their possession to be turned over to Lt. Joshua Collins, Ordnance Officer. Commanding Officers of Regiments and Battalions are admonished that they will be held responsible for a prompt compliance with the foregoing orders. They will each report to this office the date, on which these orders are executed, and at the same time forward a return of the troops sent to the field.

III. As these troops arrive at Goldsboro Gen. Leavenworth will organize them into regiments, and send them to relieve the regiments of the first class. When so relieved these latter regiments will be dismissed and sent to their homes, having previously turned in their arms and accoutrements to the Ordnance Officer, Lieut. Collins. The design being to require thirty days service from each individual, those of the first class who may not have completed that period at the time the regiment to which they are attached is relieved they will be required to serve out the remainder of the time in the next regiment.

From the Southern Cultivator.

Husk Beds.—We find in an old paper the subjoined very useful paragraph. We can also add our testimony to the great superiority of husks over straw for under beds:

As each autumn has returned, for

several years past, we have advised

all corn-growers to save their husks,

for under beds, believing they are

the best substance for this purpose

that can be used. They should

be the inner husks clean and whole,

and spread on some airy floor for a

few days, in order that they may

become perfectly dry. Then they

may be put into the beds, and they

will last for many years. We have

some of the under-beds now in our

house, which have been in use more

than twenty years; and, with an

annual ventilation and beating, by

being emptied on a chamber floor,

and with a little replenishing with

new husks, they are now as good

and lively as when new. The husks

had better not be stripped up as

soon as done. This makes the
