REPORTS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.

FROM RICHMOND.

RICHMOND, Jan. 26.—Northern papers 23rd received—Greater portion of the larger vessels of Porter's fleet, recently operating against Fort Fisher, returned, and now anchored at Hampton Roads. Genl. Abbott, with brigade of troops, was making forward movement in direction of Wilmington. On the 18th, five blockade-runners ran into New Inlet, not knowing Fort Fisher had been captured.

Telegram from Cairo, 21st, says, present indications are that Thomas' army will not move from its present position on Tennessee river, as winter quarters are being built. Toronto Leader says the British Government have ordered thirty gunboats, carrying thirty-five hundred men, to be sent out from England to the lakes.

Wilson is reelected Senator from Massachusetts.

Telegram from Toronto says, Burleigh has been committed, subject to extradition, under treaty with United States.

RICHMOND, Jan. 26.—Nothing of importance in the Senate to-day. Message from the President vetoing act to send newspapers to soldiers free of postage, made the order of the day for Saturday.

In House bill to increase the number of midshipmen passed yesterday. Senate, notwithstanding President's veto, it was rejected for want of a two-thirds vote—yays 39—nays 36.—Then resolved into secret session.

Every item has been carefully revised and with the valuable aid of Mr. George W. Moredeca, they trust the schedule, now presented, will prove satisfactory to both the Government and the people. They would respectfully urge the people to hasten on with their supplies to maintain and feed our gallant army now assembled just on our borders, and in whose gallantry and fortitude, under God, we alone owe our exemption from the horrors of a revolution, of our homes and families by the barbarous, inhuman foe, who have constantly shown they only want the power, and not the will to destroy us and take all we have.
