TELEGRAPHIC.

REPORTS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.

MACOX, Jan. 28.—Private advices from Savannah states that Sherman commenced his movement on South Carolina on the 17th inst. with three columns. His main column moving towards Charleston, taking nearly all his transportation. Two other columns, in light marching order, are moving by separate roads towards Branchville. Gen. Hill has issued orders to the non-combatants to leave Augusta.

CHARLESTON, Jan. 27.—The Yankee gun boat *Diochring*, got aground in Combahee yesterday, four batteries opened on her and set her on fire, burning her to the waters edge. All of the crew escaped except a Lieut. and five men. The prisoners were brought to the city to-day, they report the Monitor sunk off Sullivan's Island by torpedo, was the *Patagonia*. Only five out of the crew of three hundred were saved, all the rest were drowned.

WILMINGTON, Jan. 28.—A fire occurred at 1 p. m. to-day, in a lot of cotton and four hundred and thirty five bales on the Wharf in front of the Custom House, and was nearly all consumed, without doing any damage to the adjacent building. Stiff N. W. breeze, very cold. Two car loads of cotton were consumed this morning on the W. & W. R. R. four miles from town. All quiet below.

MACOX, 28th.—The *Marietta* Hotel at Marietta, was destroyed by fire on the night of the 20th inst, supposed to be accidental.

RICHTON, Jan. 28th.—Senator Hunter of Virginia, Vice President Stephens and Judge Campbell of Ala. have been appointed commissioners to proceed to Washington to confer with the authorities of the United States Government on the question of peace. They will leave to-morrow.

RICHTON, Jan. 28th.—The Senate to-day again passed the bill authorizing the termination of newspapers to the soldiers free of postage. Notwithstanding the President's objection, year 12, says, 3. Nothing of importance done in the House.

RICHTON, Jan. 28th.—Gen. Breckenridge has been appointed Sec'y of War. It is reported that Mr. Johnson of North Carolina, Gov. Vance's competitor for governor when first elected, will be appointed Commissary General, also Northrop resigned.

A SILENT GENERAL.

The *Charlotteville Chronicle* compares Gen. Lee with some of the noisy characters of the war. It says: "Here comes a man bred to the army. He had been reared a gentleman. He despised hubbub. He loved order, and everything and everybody in his place. He held the ladies at Calpaper Court-house, in 1861, who came out to greet him, to 'go home.' In Richmond, they said he had no manners—he attended to his business and spoke little. They sent him to Western Virginia—a small theatre—when Beauregard was at Manassas and Johnson at Winchester; he went and made no comment. The campaign failed, they called him *Turneydrop*; he did not attempt to excuse himself. Soon we find him in a blaze of glory, the hero of the battles around Richmond. He is still silent. He marches to Manassas, and achieves another great victory; not a word escapes him. He takes Winchester; is elected at Sharpsburg for the want of men; defeats Burnside at Fredericksburg; hocks at Chancellorsville; but he breaks not his silence. He has the terrible trial of Gettysburg. He only remarked, 'It was my fault,' and then, in the present year, he has conducted the greatest of all his campaigns—undoubtedly one of the finest of the war. Silent still. When will he speak. Has he nothing to say? What does he think of our affairs? Should he speak how the country would hang upon every word that fell from his lips?"

Cure for the Small-Pox.—The following prescription is vouchsafed by the Eastport, Me., *Scalpel*, as a cure for the small pox: "Give to the patient two tablespoonfuls of a mixture of hop yeast and water, sweetened with molasses, so as to be palatable, equal parts of each, three times a day. Children under twelve years of age should take two teaspoonfuls three times a day. Diet, boiled rice and milk, and toasted bread moistened with water, and without butter. Eat no meat. Give castor oil as often as the patient is thirsty. Give physic when necessary. If the above treatment is strictly followed, so marks of small pox will remain."

They would respectfully urge the people to sustain us with their supplies to maintain and feed our gallant army now assembled just on our borders, and in whose gallantry and fortitude, under God, we place our entire confidence from the banner of a revolution, of our home and families by the barbarous inhumanity, who have constantly shown they only want the power, and not the will to destroy us and take all we have.
