REPORTS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.

NORTHERN NEWS.

Richmond, March 13.

Northern papers of 11th, contain a Yankee version of the raid on Fredericksburg. They claim to have carried off six hundred boxes of tobacco.

Gen. Whiting died at Governor's Island last Friday, from a wound recently at Fort Fisher.

Senator Hale, of New Hampshire, and not Smith, of Kentucky, has been appointed Minister to Spain.

The Olinde was still at Ferrill on the 13th ult. The Spanish authorities had permitted limited repairs to be made. It is reported that her commander had gone to Paris to annul a contract of sale.

Advices from New Orleans of the 4th, contain no military news of importance.

CONGRESSIONAL.

Richmond, March 13.—The Senate passed the appropriation bill for the last six months of the present year.

A message from the President of some length, was received, stating his objections to the exemption bill recently passed. The message was referred to the Committee of Military Affairs.

Mr. Wigfall made a personal explanation in relation to recent editorials in the *Enquirer*, in which he admitted that he was the Senator referred to as being in favor of inducing the President to resign. The Senate resolved into secret session.

In the House the President's message in relation to the exemption act, was read, and in accordance with the President's recommendations, the bill was considered and passed. It authorizes the President to detail such persons for employment in the several departments, as the heads shall certify to be indispensably necessary, not exceeding one hundred in all. It limits the exemption of skilled artisans and mechanics to service in the field, not for service in local defence. Nothing else of general importance done.

Both Houses will adjourn *sine die* to-morrow, the 14th.
