NAVAL STORES.—We note sales of 1,480 bbls. Turpentine at \$2 10 for soft and \$1 10 for hard. Spirits of 1,300 bbls common resin at 90 cts. A small lot of spirits turpentine at 25c and another do. do. at 25c per gallon. The market for the latter article is somewhat unsettled, and heavy holders are shipping in preference to selling at present offers.
PEAS.—Sales 30 bushels white Beans at \$1 25.
TIMBER.—Sales 3 rafts prime mill at \$ 50 per M.

CHARLESTON, Dec. 9.—There was a good demand for Cotton yesterday, the sales having reached fully 1,700 bales. Prices were unsettled, and the sales were at extremes ranging from 7 1/2 to 8 1/2.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 8.—The advices brought by the Pacific were received here about noon to-day, and gave an active impulse to our Cotton market, 12,000 bales having been sold. Prices closed firm, without a decided advance.—Strict middling was quoted at 7 1/2. Whiskey has declined one cent, and 1400 barrels were sold at from 17 to 17 1/2 per gallon. Molasses has declined, but is active, and 3,000 barrels were disposed of at 25c. for prime. Rio Coffee was dull at \$ 8 to 8 1/2.—Tel. Cor. Char. Courier.
