MAMMOTH STEAMERS -We see it stated in the London Times that a proposition is on foot to build iron steamers of 720 feet in length, with 90 feet beam, and 36 in depth, with four engines of 1000 horse power, and a screw, whilst there will be eight masts, with huge latteen sails. The vessels are to be built of iron, and will be not only shot but fire proof, and, from the novel method, though simple, and for strength known to every school boy, their immense length renders them more safe than those of smaller construction .-It is calculated to carry 2000 passengers, with a theatre for amusements, &c , and could, in case of war, open a battery of three hundred guns.
