PAWNING IN AFRICA.-The system of pawning is prevalent in Africa. In case of distress for cowries, one or more members of the family is pawned for a certain sum, from 20,000 to 60,000 cowries, according to the age and ability of the person pawned to work his time, as the interest for that sum ; or by fixing the interest, if paid in cowries, at 200 cowries every fith day, 400. every ninth, or 800 cowries at every seventeenth day vice, the person so pawned, though he may reside in the house of his pawnee, if a young person, is not looked upon as the property of the lender of the money. In time of sickness, or if he commits any crime, he is sent over to his relatives, who are responsible for the money due, and who also must bear the consequences of the state of his herlth and of his bad conduct. This makes a great difference between a slave and a pawn. system of pawn, as it is practiced in this country, proved beneficial to thousands of families since s wars broke out with unbounded fury.
