FROM WILLIAMSBURG-THE FEDERALS ATTACK OUR PICKETS AND ARE REPULSED_HARRISON-BURG IN POSSESSION OF THE CONFEDERATES. RICHMOND, VA., May 5th, 1861.

An official letter from Williamsburg states that the enemy pursued our Cavalry pickets nearly to town on Sunday afternoon, but were easily repulsed by our rear guard, commanded by Brig. Gen. McLaws. The enemy lost one plece Virginia Cavalry, under Lieut, Col. Wickham, made a handsome charge.

An official dispatch from Staunton, May 5th, states that the enemy evacuated Harrisonburg on Monday, and that the town is now in the possession of our Cavalry under Capt. Winfield.

THE NEW ORLEANS AFFAIR.

AUGUSTA, GA., May 6th, 1962. The Jackson Mississippian of the lat inst. has seen New Orleans papers of Tuesday. The authorities of the city held out to the last in stubborn, heroic refusal to lower the flag of their adoption. All the guns in Fort Jackson were spiked before the surrander of the Fort. Fort Pike was evacuated, and everything it contained abandoned.

Farragut sent a communication to the Mayor and Common Council, on the 28th, complaining about the refusal to haul down the Confederate flag, etc., and notified them to remove the women and children within 48 hours.

The Mayor convened the Council, and decided not to recede from their position. Louisiana's flag still floats to the breeze. Mayor Monroe nobly replies to Farragut, raying : We will stand your bombardment unarmed and undefended as we are. Farragut on the 29th again addressed the Mayor, saying that Forts Jackson and St. Phillip had fallen .with all the civil power of the city.

The Evening Delta, of Wednesday, says that all the Confederate flags in the city have been lowered, and the Federal flag floats from all the public buildings, under the protection of the enemy's guns. All the city papers are still published, but they are confined to local topics.

The Federals expected to take military possession of the city on Wednesday.

The commandant of the French steamer Milan, was opposite New Orleans, and notified Farragut that 48 hours notice of the bombardment was ridiculous, and demanded sixty days for its evacuation.

LATER FROM THE WEST.

AUGUSTA, May 6th, 1862. The Sayannah Republican's Corinth correspondent of the 5th inst., says that the roads are in shocking condition from the late heavy rains, but it is impossible to postpone a general engagement. The enemy is making a movement on our right. It is supposed it is intended against the Mobile Rail Road. Arrangements have been made to meet them. MORGAN AT WORK.

Col. Morgan defeated and took prisoners, to the number of 280 Federals, at Pulaski, Tennessee. He also captured a train loaded with Federal property. VIRGINIA LEGISLATURE-GOV. LETCHER'S MESSAGE.

RICHMOND, VA., May 6th, 1862. The Virginia Legislature met yesterday, in extra sea sion. The Message of Gov. Letcher wassent in to-day .-He says that in his opinion the Conscription act is unconstitutional, but the peculiar condition of affairs existing at the time of its passage forbears debate upon the question. Harmony, unity, and conciliation is indispensito success, and he now urges upon the people a prompt and cheerful response.

The Governor says that we have no occasion for despondency. Our successes so far have been more brilllant than those attained by our ancestors in the origin of their great straggle.

He arges a vigorous prosecution of the war, and says that we must make it a war of invasion. Maryland must be redeemed, and the North must feel the evils of war before we can hope for a permanent peace. The fall of New Orrenders a change in our policy necessary, and it should be made without delay.
