FOR THE JOURNAL. FROM WILLIAMSBURG—THE FEDERALS ATTACK OUR PICKETS AND ARE REPULSED—HARRISONBURG IN POSSESSION OF THE CONFEDERATES.

An official letter from Williamsburg states that the enemy pursued our Cavalry pickets to town on Sunday afternoon, but were easily repulsed by our rear guard, commanded by Brig. Gen. McLaws.

An official dispatch from Staunton, May 5th, states that the enemy evacuated Harrisonburg on Monday, and that the town is now in the possession of our Cavalry under Capt. Winfield.

THE NEW ORLEANS AFFAIR. AUGUSTA, Ga., May 5th, 1862. The Jackson Mississippi of the 1st Inst. has been Orleans papers of Tuesday. The authorities of the city held out to the last in stubborn heroism to lower the flag of their adoption.

The Mayor convened the Council, and decided not to recede from their position. Louisiana's flag still floats to the breeze. Mayor Monroe nobly replies to Farragut, saying: "We will stand your bombardment unarm'd and undefend'd as we are."

The Evening Delta, of Wednesday, says that all the Confederate flags in the city have been lowered, and the Federal flag floats from all the public buildings, under the protection of the enemy's guns.

The Federalists expected to take military possession of the city on Wednesday. The commandant of the French steamer Milan, was opposite New Orleans, and notified Farragut that 48 hours notice of the bombardment was ridiculous, and demanded sixty days for its evacuation.

LATER FROM THE WEST. AUGUSTA, Ga., May 5th, 1862. The Savannah Republican's Coriath correspondent of the 5th Inst., says that the roads are in shocking condition from the late heavy rains, but it is impossible to postpone a general advance. The enemy is making a movement on our right.

Col. Morgan defeated and took prisoner, to the number of 280 Federals, at Polaski, Tennessee. He also captured a train loaded with Federal property.

VIRGINIA LEGISLATURE—GOV. LETCHER'S MESSAGE. RICHMOND, Va., May 6th, 1862. The Virginia Legislature met yesterday, in extra session. The Message of Gov. Letcher was read in to-day.

The Governor says that he has no occasion for despondency. Our successes so far have been more brilliant than those attained by our ancestors in the origin of their great struggle.

He urges a vigorous prosecution of the war, and says that we must make it a war of invasion. Maryland must be redeemed, and the North must feel the evils of war before we can hope for a permanent peace.

The enemies in Virginia overrun by the enemy contain a slave population of eighty thousand, which, at a moderate valuation, is worth forty five millions of dollars.

The Governor says that he has been informed that the Constitution adopted by the traitors who constituted the Wheeling Convention, has been rejected by the people to whom it was submitted.

The Governor also vindicates the people of Northwestern Virginia against the imputations on their loyalty.

A correspondent of the Philadelphia Inquirer, writing on the 30th ult., says: "The place [Fredericksburg] is nearly evacuated by the people, only two stores being open by the people. A day or two since some of the disloyal inhabitants attempted to put up a Secession flag, but the more considerate inhabitants prevented it, resulting in quite a disturbance."

There were quite a number of applications for passes of men and women, who said they were Northern people, and desired to come North. Some of the residents of the place, professing to be Union men, say that there is a Union League there of four hundred persons."

PEAS.—Cow sell readily at \$1 10 to \$1 15 per bushel. PORK.—Fresh sells from carts at 15 to 16 cents per lb. POTATOES.—Irish \$3 50 to \$4, and Sweet \$1 to \$1 20 per bushel. PEAS.—Are brought in slowly, and sell from carts at \$1 40 to \$1 50 per bushel. RICE.—Clean sells from first hands at 4 cents in casks, and 4 cents per lb. in bbls. SUGAR.—The stock is very light, and prices have further advanced. We quote New Orleans at 23 to 30 cents per lb., as in quality. RAISINS.—The quantity being made is not sufficient to meet the demand, and prices have further advanced. We quote at \$7 25 per bushel, in lots to suit. SHREDS.—27 to 28 cents per yard.
