THE ATEANTA PIRE

AUGUSTA, GA., Way 19th, 1882. The fire at Allanta, on the 14th inst., destroyed Wallace's rie, containing eight hundred bales of Cotton, two ndred therees of Rice, two headred and fifty thousand pounds government Bacou, and other government stores, and two hundred barrels of Sugar, Oil and Hides ; ten thouand pounds Bason were nearly all destroyed, belonging to private parties. The ware house totally destroyed, and the adjoining buildings were buily damaged. The total loss is estimated at \$100,000, upon which there was insurance of \$35,000. The Augusta Insurance Company lost about \$18,-000. Two man were severely injured, one thought to be mortally.

DESTRUCTION OF THE VIRGINIA.

BECHMOND, VA., May 17th, 1862. It is stated that the Virginia was destroyed by order of Commodore Tathall. He ascertained on Fainrday that Norfolk had been evacuated by our troops, and was in posses" sion of the enemy. The pilots on board advised against poing round to York River. The crew then proceeded to lighten the sersel, in order to take her into James River .-Coal and plg fron was thrown everboard until it is said the wood work of her hull was exposed: finding it still impracticable to asceed the river, it was determined to abandon the vessel and burn her, which was accordingly done.

Ptom the Petersburg Express. The Evacuation of Norfolk.

Just as we expected, the traitor Byers, who stole the Confederate steamer A. J. White, and went over to the nemy on Thursday, communicated such information to folk by the Yankers and basten its abandonment by our troops. On Friday, the enemy landed a heavy body of troops variously estimated at from five to seven thousand, at Ocean View, some eight or ten miles in rear of Norfolk, and commenced a march upon the city. The orces consisted of infantry, artillery and cavalry, and the latter came near cutting off a large portion of Col. Chambliss' regiment, which had been stationed near Sewell's Point. Our forces, among them the Confederate Cadets of this city, thribble-quicked towards the old borough, and made a very narrow escape. It is said that when we burnt Indian Poll Creek Bridge, across Tanner's Creek, the Yankee cavalry were at one end of it, and would have seriously interfered with our operations, but for the Beauregard Artillery, of Lynchburg, who by a law well-directed shots, sent the Yunkee horsemen flying beyond the reach of our guns.

It is believed that all of our troops, arms, ammunition, quartermaster's and commissary's stores were safely removed. But we regret to hear that the Confederate less at the Gosport Navy Yard has been immense. An employee in the yard ever since the war commenced estimates the loss there at six millions or more. A large quantity of very valuable machinery, and some \$200,000 worth of copper have been left to the enemy. All the buildings that could be destroyed, were fired and emsumed. It is a matter of universal regret, . ' at two gunboats, which had just been completed, and received their armament and stores, were burnt. These could easily have been carried to Richmond, passing to the mouth of James River, under the protection of the Merrimac. Four other guaboats, on the stocks, and unfinished. ware also consigned to the flames. The splendid trans port Wm. Selden, and a number of smaller steamers, tugs, etc., were all burnt. These two, it is stated, could have been carried to Richmond without risk, But we presume the Confederate government has more money than it well knows what to do with, and desires to give employment to artizans in building new vessels.

Nurfolk. They crossed the river at Portsmouth, and from there marched a distance of 26 miles to Suffolk.

Camp's -and their friends yesterday very naturally left and expressed much aniety as to their fate. It is stated that the water between the

baggage, etc., is inevitable.

It is generally believed by the few civilians who did get off, that not more than 100 males outside of the army, have left Norfolk. Many females have left since it became known that the city was to be abandoned to the tender mercies of the Lincolnites, and a large number who desired to leave, still remain because of their inability to get away. Soldiers inform as that when they passed through Norfolk, Saturday morning, they were everywhere met by groups of ladies, who with tears in their eyes, implored their protection.

Strange to say, our authorities decided very suddenly to evacuate the place, but gave the people no information of the fact; and stranger still, they first sent the greater portion of the troops away, and then commenced to move the valuables. Common sense would have suggested that our troops be retained to hold and defend place until every article of value had been removed. West Point" thought differently, however, and hence the brilliant, but very precipitate departure.

It is the opinion of nine out of every ten men of ordinary mind, that Norfolk could have been held for twelve months longer with as much ease as it has been since the war commenced. With the Merrimac guarding the entrance to the James and Elizabeth rivers, and the new iron-clad City of Riehmond in Albemarie Sound, harrassing and destroying Burnside's fleet; and a few more Col. Wrights at the head of 5 or 600 brave men, defeating and cutting to pieces such Yankee Generals as Reno with 3,000 or 4,000; while our gallant oys at Sewell's Point and Ocean View, kept," watch and vigil" in that direction, all the Wools and Burnsides, and McClellans in Yankee land, could not have taken the place. Eymptoms of Yellow Fever in the South. The Savannah correspondent of the Richmond Whig says there are certain premonitory signs which clearly and uncringly herald the approach of the vellow fe-One is the appearance of a certain fly, an in sect that never visits that region without being followed by a severe epidemic. It is known as the yellow fever fly, and has made on unusually early advent this year, in very large swarms. Again, it has never failed to be the case that the poultry have been visited with an epidemic of some sort previous to the appearance of yellow fever, and the mortality was never greater among the fowls than it has been for the last eight or ten days. Last year the South escaped entirely this fearful scourge, but two years of exemption are not to be anticipated from anything we have heard of in the history of the past. Under these circumstances it would seem the dictate of prudence to remove from the Southern coast those of our troops who have not been acclimated, and transfer them to some region where they will not be exposed to an enemy more deadly than a battle.
