THE GALENA ON FIRE.—THE FEDERAL FLEET RETIRES.

RICHMOND, Va., May 15th.—P. M.

The following was Bulletin'd at the newspaper office this morning.

Federal gunboats, opposed the Monitor and Galena, opened upon our batteries at Wilton, about eight o'clock this morning.

The enemy fired with great rapidity and violence. Our batteries replied deliberately.

One o'clock, P. M.—We have just fired the Galena, and the other gunboats have retired down the river.

Our loss is four killed and eight wounded. The Galena was on fire when she retired.

Our troops are in high spirits, and confident of success.

Confirmation of the Galena being fired.

RICHMOND, Va., May 15th, 1862.

The following official dispatch has been received:

DARBY'S BLUFF, May 15th—11 o'clock, A. M.

Two We have engaged the enemy's five gunboats for two and a half hours. We fired the Galena, iron clad.

She was withdrawn, and is going down the river, accompanied by three wooden vessels. Our loss is killed and wounded is small.

RICHMOND TO BE DEFENDED AT ALL HAZARDS.

RICHMOND, Va., May 15th, 1862.

The following proclamation was issued to-day by the Governor of Virginia:

A Proclamation.

The General Assembly of this Commonwealth having resolved that the capital of the State shall be defended to the last extremity, if such defense is in accordance with the views of the President of the Confederate States; and having declared that whatever destruction and loss of property by the State or individuals shall thereby result, will be cheerfully submitted to, and this action being warmly approved and seconded by the Executive, I do therefore request all officers who are out of service from any cause, and all others who may be willing to unite in defending the capital of this State, to assemble this evening at the City Hall at 5 o'clock, and proceed forthwith to organize a force, as prompt and efficient action is absolutely necessary. We have a gallant army in the field, upon which we fully and confidently rely, but no effort should be spared which can contribute to the noble object in view. The capital of Virginia must not be surrendered. Virginians must rally to the rescue.

Given under my hand and under the seal of the Commonwealth, this 15th day of May, 1862, and in the 36th year of the Commonwealth.

(Signed.) JOHN LETCHER.

In accordance with the above proclamation, there was a large assemblage at the City Hall at 5 o'clock this afternoon, and the finest spirit prevailed. A brief address was delivered by Gov. Letcher and another by Mayor Mayo.

They both declared that they would never surrender the city. This announcement was received with loud cheering. Resolutions were adopted for the organization of a regiment to defend the city.

Latest reports from the river state that the Monitor and Galena are steaming down the river.

RICHMOND QUIET.—FEDERAL GUN-BOATS GONE DOWN JAMES RIVER.

RICHMOND, Va., May 16th, 1862.

The city is very quiet to-day. Business has been suspended in accordance with the President's proclamation.

The Federal gun-boats have gone down James river below City Point.

From Corinth,

MOBILE, Ala., May 15th, 1862.

The Advertiser's special despatches from Corinth state that skirmishing had continued throughout the day without results of importance on either side. The Confederates today captured one hundred and fifty barrels. The advance of the Confederates had captured seventy Federals near Paris, Tenn.

European intelligence has been received up to the 21st ult. The London Times consider the check to the Federal advance at Shiloh equivalent to a Confederate victory, and finds in its confirmation of his opinion that the military difficulties of the North had just begun—with the attempted invasion of the Cotton States.

The steamer Tosa Gais had left Liverpool with a heavy cargo of arms and ammunition.

The London Times speculate on the prospective fate of the negro population of the South, and in any result of the war, sees for them only slavery extermination or extinction.

A weekly journal, established to advocate the Confederate cause, will soon make its appearance in London.

MOBILE, May 15th, 1862.

A special dispatch to the Advertiser, from Corinth, May 15th, states that the Missouri Republican contains the particulars of the capture of New Orleans, and editorially considers the Confederate cause as gone.

A dispatch from Nashville to the Republican, says that Morgan had a narrow escape at Cartage, northeast of Nashville, on the Cumberland river, with twenty of his men, the remaining one hundred and eighty being made prisoners.

On the 11th inst., one hundred and fifty sick and wounded Federals, of Halleck's army, were shipped from Pittsburg Landing to St. Louis.

The Missouri river has fallen two feet in the last twenty-four hours.

The London Times, of 23d ult., says that the battle of Shiloh has given ground for far more apprehension than hope in the North.

There is nothing new in warlike movements this evening. The enemy still hesitates in his threatened advance.

Sixty-one paroled prisoners were sent to-day. As a escort which went with them found the Federal pickets within four miles of Corinth.

Opening of the Port of New Orleans to Trade.

WASHINGTON, May 9, 1862.—The preliminaries for the opening of the port of New Orleans to foreign and loyal domestic trade have been arranged, and only the official announcement of the Union occupation of that city was waited for before the issue of the proclamation. This official intelligence was received to-day, and the announcement of the opening of this important Southern port will be made immediately after the return from Fort Monroe of the President and Secretaries of War and the Treasury, who are hourly expected.
