A Proclamation.
By **Z. B. VANCE, Governor of North Carolina.**
WHEREAS, INFORMATION HAS REACHED ME that certain persons un mindful of the calls of patriotism and loyal of the duties of good citizens, are using their influence to prevent obedience to the law of Congress known as the Conscription Law, and that others are attempting to organize an open resistance to its execution; and whereas, such conduct being not only in direct violation of law, but also detrimental in the highest degree, to the cause of our country, it becomes my sacred duty to prevent and repress the same by all the means in my power:

Now, therefore, I, **Z. B. VANCE, Governor of North Carolina,** do hereby issue this proclamation, warning all persons to desist from such un patriotic and criminal conduct; earnestly hoping that all who are disinclined to obey the laws of our country, either by reason of age, infirmity, or cowardice, will cease to disseminate those who are notified positively all persons contemplating such a violation of the law, if there really be any such persons, will be held to account, and that they will be guided by the principles of the Constitution, and will not attempt to escape its penal ties. While and must not permit thousands of our best and bravest have thousands upon thousands of our best and bravest have cheerfully obeyed the law, and by their patriotic valor have driven the enemy back to permit others to evade the law, or worse still, to resist it by open violence. Let no law, or worse still, to resist it by open violence. Let no appeal to all loyal and patriotic citizens to sustain those who are charged with its execution, and that the Great Seal of the State, done at the City of Raleigh, the 15th day of September, 1862.
