The Military Fremption Act.

The following a a copy of the Exemption act as finally assed by both Houses of Congress;

a Brat to exempt certain persons from military service, and to repeal the act entitled "An act to exempt certain

persons from enrollment for service in the acts, of the Confederate States," approved the 21st of April, 1862.

INVALUES, OFFICEES OF GOVERNMENT, CLERES, ETC.

1. The Congress of the Confederate States of America do enact, That all persons who shall be held units for military. service in the field by reason of bodily or mental incapacity rimoecility, under rules to be prescribed by the Secretary of War, the Vice President of the Confederate States; the officers, judicial and executive, of the Confederate and State Governments, including postmasters appointed by the President and confirm d by the Senate, and such clerks in their offices as are allowed by the P stmaster-Gereral, and now employed, and excluding all other postmasers, their assurants and clerks; and except such btate officers as the several States may have declared, or may hereafter do lare, by law to be liable to militia duty; the members of both Houses of the Congress of the Confedence States, and of the Legislatures of the several States, nd their respective officers; all cierks now in the offices of the Confederate and State Governments, authorized by aw receiving salaries or fees.

VOLUBTIER TIOGIA.

All volunteer troops here ofere raised by any State since act of April 18th, 1:62.

TRANSPORTATION AND TELEGRAPH COMPANIES.

ARTISANS EMPLOYED ON GOVERNMENT WORK,

All artisans, mechanics, and employees in the establish ment of the Government for the manufacture of arms, ordnance stores, and other munitions of war, who may be certified by the officer m charge thereof as necessary for such establishment; also, all artisans, mechanics and employees in the establishme ats of such persons as are or may be engaged under contracts with the Government in furnishing arms, ordnance, ordnance stores, and other munitions of war, saddles, harness, and army supplies : Provided that the chief of the ordnance bureau, or some ordnance officer authorized by him for the purpose, shall approve of the number of the operatives required in such establishments; all persons employed in the manufacture of arms, or ordnance of any kind, by the several States; or by contractors to furnish the same to the several State Governments, whom the Governor or Secretary of State thereof may certify to be necessary to the same; all persons engaged in the construction of ships, gunboats, engines, sails, or other articles necessary to the public defence under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy; all superintendents, mechanics and miners employed in the production and manufacture of salt to the extent of twenty bushels per day, and of lead and iron; and all persons engaged in making charcoal for making pig and bar iron, not to embrace laborers. messengers, wagoners and servants, unless employed at works conducted under the authority and by the officers or agents of a State, or in works employed in the production of iron for the Confederate States.

One male citizen for every 500 head of cattle, for every 250 head of horses or mules, and one shepherd for every 500 head of sheep, of such persons as are engaged exclu-Sively in raising stock, provided there is no wnite male adult not liable to do military duty engaged with such persons in russing said stock.

OVERSEERS ON PLANTATIONS.

To secure the proper police of the country, one person, either as agent, owner, or overseer, on each plantation on which one white person is required to be kept by the laws or ordinances of any State, and on which there is no white male adult not tlable to do military service; and in States having no such law, one person, as agent, owner, or overseer, on each plantation of twenty negroes, and on which there is no white male adult not liable to military service, and, furthermore, for additional police for every twenty negroes on two or more plantations within five miles of each other, and each having less than twenty negroes, and on which there is no male adult not liable to military duty, one person, being the eidest of the owners or overseers on such plantations.

FPECIAL EXEMPTIONS.

Also, a regiment raised under and by authority of the State of Texas for the frontier defence, now in the service of said State, while in such service; and such other persons as the President shall be satisfied, on account of justice, equity of necessity, ought to be exempted, are hereby ex-empted, from military service in the armies of the Confed-erate States: Provided that the exemptions herein above enumerated shall only continue whilst the persons exempted are actually engaged in their respective pursuits or oc-
