The copperheads attempted to stave off Sumuer's anti-mediation resolutions, but they passed by a strong majority .-When Kerrigan's name was called in the yeas and nays on the Missouri emancipation bill in the House, he denounced it in such terms that he was ordered by the speaker to resume his seat. He did not set down until he remarked that the people and the army would not consent to so much legislation for the negro. Expectations of a scene rose to a high pitch for a few minutes.
