PARTIES interested are hereby notified that the Board of officers appointed "to examine into and report on the justice and amount of claims" for "loss of slaves which have been impressed by Confederate authorities, or under false laws" for the use of the Confederate Government, and while engaged in laboring on the public defenses, have escaped to the enemy, or died, or contracted diseases, which have, after their discharge, resulted fatally," is organized at Richmond, and will, on Monday next, the 18th instant, begin its regular sessions. The evidence of ownership, of the loss of improvement, of the age, soundness and value of the slave at the impression, and of the loss of the slave, whether by escape or death, with the circumstances attending the same, must accompany the claims.  
All the facts must be set forth in and verified by affidavit of competent witnesses.
