THE RADICAL RECONSTRUCTION PLAN.

THE RADICAL RECONSTRUCTION PLAN. WASHINGTON, April 22. It has been given out in confidential circles for some days past, that the Radicals were maturing a general plan of reconstruction of the Southern States. But few were initiated into the mysteries of this scheme. It appears that it emanated from Robert Dale Owen, who, it is said, submitted it to the President. Yesterday the Reconstruction Committee met at an early hour, when the plan was unfolded to the Committee by Thaddens Ste-vens. It is understood that the Committee agreed to it. It is more Radical than anything that has heretofore come from that direction. It is in the shape of a joint resolution to amend the Constitushape of a joint resolution to amend the Constitu-

shape of a joint resolution to amend the Constitu-tion, and professes to provide for the restoration to the Southern States of all their political rights. Article first of the amendment says that there shall be no discrimination made by any State nor by the United States as to the civil rights of par-sons because of race, color, or provious condition of servitude. Second. That from and after the fourth day of July, in the year 1876, no discrim-ination shall be made by any State nor by classes of persons of the right of suffrage because of race or color. Third. Until July 4, 1876, no class of persons as to the right of any of whom suffrage or color. Third. Until July 4, 1876, no class of persons as to the right of any of whom suffrage discrimination shall be made by any State because of race or color or previous condition of servitude shall be included in the basis of representation.— Fourth. Debts or obligations already incurred, or which may be hereafter incurred in aid of insur-rection of war against the Union, and claims for compensation for loss of service of persons held to involuntary servitude or labor, shall not be paid by any State or by the United States. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States. It is then further to be pro-vided by act of Congress, that whenever the above amendment shall have become part of the Constitution, and any of the Southern States shall have ratified it and modified its constitution and laws in conformity thereto, the Senators and constitution, and any of the Southern States shall have ratified it and modified its constitution and laws in conformity thereto, the Senators and Representatives from such State duly elected and qualified, and taken the usual oath of office, be admitted ; provided, that no person who having been an officer in the army or navy of the United States, or having been a member of the Thirty-sixth Congress, or of the cabinet in the year 1860, did take part in the late insurrection, shall be all-gible to either branch of the national Legislature until after July 4, 1876. The above will probably be reported to the House to-morrow. The state-ment that this scheme is approved by the Presi-dent is without any foundation in fact. It was submitted to him several days ago by Robert Dale Owen, but he gave no indication, by word or ac-tion, that he looked upon it with favor. There is authority for stating that the President not only disapproves of it, but regards it as a most dangardisapproves of it, but regards it as a most danger-ous and revolutionary scheme against the rights and privileges of the States, North and South.
