Any one who walks near the hallowed grounds allotted to our Confederate dead will feel the pathos and soul-subduing eloquence that speaks in silence, the dreariness, the decay and neglect that have seized the sacred localities for their own, and are fast bearing them to a melancholy oblivion.—

The places that knew them will know them no have forever unless affection assumes the gradient. more forever, unless affection assumes the gracion office of conservator of the touching memorials of the patriots who exhausted themselves in the conthe patriots who exhausted themselves in the common effort, and at last fell, far from home and kindred. For innverthy sepulchres. When one thinks of the trials of these gallant menhow they underwent all privation and suffering, and how at length they dared and accepted death—it is a most affecting spectacle to look upon the sunken tombs, the rotting headboards, that will soon cease to individualize their names, their deeds and characters, and will leave these heroes of a good fight and an indiscriminate and pitiless forgetfulness. It is not to be supposed that any of them were alone in this world, with none to think of them or care for them. The father had all the connections of a family to mourn his untimely fate; the husband lies far from the wife that would have died for him; the son has left a mother that weeps for him and will not be comforted; and the weeps for him and will not be comforted; and the brother had gentle sisters whose soft fingers would have smoothed the contracted brow that warmed with a thought of home, and then grew cold for-ever. But solitary let him be, without kith or kin-

"His is his country's now and fame's; One of the few immortal names That were not born to die!"

In Hollywood Cemetery twenty thousand bodies of the dear and devoted crumble to undistinguish-ed dust; while near by the Federal dead are reed dust; while near by the Federal dead are remembered and cared for by national respect or private love. O countrymen!—O countrywomen! what a mortifying contrast! We are poor in purse; the whole country is in indigent circumstances, but our poverty of heart is beyond all estimate if we are not ready to do our duty to the mouldering remains of our martyred patriots. It is not alone in Hollywood that our dead lie uncherished and unregarded. Thousands lie in Oakwood and other cometeries subject to the removal wood and other cemeteries subject to the remorse-less touch of Time's effacing fingers. Is there no kindly memory of these men? Will the people of the city of Richmond let those who died in her defense pass from remembrance, like the beasts of the field that perish and are no more? Never! the field that perish and are no more? Never! If the heart of man can forget, the heart of woman is incapable of ingratitude. We know that we have only to point the ladies to the scenes that ask their care to insure their ceaseless exertions in a noble enterprise. We propose that they immediately organize into a society, or into several co-operative societies, whose object shall be the preservation of every existing memorial of the lamented brave,—the faithful who fell at their posts, and were hurried into shallow and ill-kept graves. Many of the tombs are without a mark to tell of those whom they inclose, but others have names and descriptions that should stand for the guidance of the search that affective stand for the guidance of the search that affection will institute, when prosperity has restored the now lacking means. Let all the heaps be rounded and turfed, and where the pame cannot be recovered, let a neat and simple board evi-dence that "A Hero" lies there unknown, but still mourned and honored none the less. a small tribute to those who risked all and lost all in the common cause. If we are impoverished the mites that we are able to contribute will effect the purpose that all should be eager to aid. When wealth has been regained, we will construct monuments worthy of us and of those whose memory

we seek to perpetuate.

We trust that the ladies will soon have committees traversing the length and breadth of the city, soliciting subscriptions to this cause. We know that no Southern men or women will withhold their money in so holy an undertaking, and when we see that we have been anticipated in other parts of the South, by similar movements, our ef-forts should be stimulated and quickened by a virtuous emulation. Winchester and Staunton have already done much, and Gordonsville, (environed by the glorious dead) has begun the laudable work. Richmond should be no laggard in this.— On every field of strife her sons have fallen, and she should treat those who lie near with a ma

nal tenderness. "Their bodies are dust: Their good swords are rust; And their souls are with the saints, we trust!

The Internal Revenue Bill. Referring to the bill lately reported by the Committee of Ways and Means, the National Intelligencer says :

It reduces the aggregate of the amount of taxa tion, in comparison with the existing act, by the sum of sixty or seventy millions, or about one-fifth. It relieves many articles of prime necessity, or which are of universal consumption, from any tax at all. Taxes are increased upon some products. Cotton is to be taxed five cents a pound, instead of two. Cotton goods are to be entitled to a drawback, when exported, equal to the taxes paid on the finished goods and upon the raw material. As to the tax upon the raw cott duced in the country it is the general belief of Congress and of our financial men that under the Congress and of our financial men that under the present state of things, the tax will fall chiefly on the consumer—that is, upon the foreign and domestic manufacturers—and that the producer will not derive any less profit from his product by reason of the tax. There may be doubt as to this, for the Southern States need all the encouragement which high prices will afford them, in their attempt to resuscitate the culture of cotton.
