Burke was a roundsman in the police force, and is understood to have been a 31 H Van Acrman, r disappointed suiter for the hand of Mrs. Willard, On Saturday afternoon last, Mrs. Willard, who was forewoman in the female department of the "World" composing room, left the office for the purpose of returning to her boarding house. While on her homeward ride in the street car, she encountered a male acquaintance—a rival of young Burke for the hand of the ladywho, upon reaching Twentieth street, courteously assisted her from the car, and 11 Sam'l Marshall, c passed on. It is supposed that this act of gallantry was witnessed by Burke, who, stung to madness by jealousy, followed her to her residence and shot her, and then took his own life.

Mrs. Willard was a woman of irreproachable character, highly esteemed by all who knew her, and endowed with remarkable energy. Besides her position in the "World" office, Mrs. Willard filled the post of fashion editress of the "Sanday Times and Messenger," which office she 11 Jno PC Shanks, r filled with ability. She also had charge, at the time of her death, of the Ocean Lodge table at the Masonic Fair, in the furtherance of which enterprise she had labored with much zeal, and in recognition of which service she was, on Friday evening last presented with a valuable diamond ring by a number of her Masonic friends. She was about thirty years of age.

Burke is represented as a young man of good character, handsome and ambitious, and manifestly had set his heart upon winning the woman he had loved, "not wisely, but too well."
