GENERAL SICKLES' ORDER No. 10. "HEADQUARTERS, SECOND MILITARY DISTRICT, CHARLESTON, S. C., April 11th, 1867. GENERAL ORDERS,

The general destitution provailing among the population of this Military District cannot be relieved without affording means for the development of their industrial resources. The nature and extent of the destitution demand extraordiand extent of the destitution demand extraordi-nary measures. The people are borne down by a heavy burden of debt; the crops of grain and garden produce falled last year; many families have been deprived of shelter; many more need food and clothing; needful implements and auxil-faries of husbandry are very scarce; the laboring population in numerous localities is threatened with starvation, unless supplied with food by the Government of the United States; the inability of a large portion of the people to pay taxes leaves the local authorities without adequate means of relief; and the gravity of the situation is increased by the general disposition shown by creditors to enforce, upon an impoverished people, the imme-diate collection of all claims. diate collection of all claims.

*To suffer all this to go on without restraint or remedy is to sacrifice the general good. The rights of creditors shall be respected; but the appeal of want and suffering must be heeded. are announced; They will continue in force, with such modifications as the occasion may require, until the civil government of the respective States shall be established, in accordance with the requirements of the Government of the be coffee. "I. Imprisonment for debt is prohibited; unless the defendant in execution shall be convicted of a fraudulent concealment or disposition of his prop-erty, with intent to hinder, delay and prevent the creditor in the recovery of his debt or demand.— And the proceedings now established in North and Bouth Carolina, respectively, for the trial and de-termination of such questions, may be adopted.


