SUPPLEMENTAL RECONSTRUCTION Bill as Passed by both Bouses of Congress

July 13th, 1857. WASHINGTON, July 13-P. M.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Reresentatives of the United States of America in mgress assembled. That it is hereby declared to have been the true intent and meaning of the act of the second day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty seven, entitled " an act to pro-vide for the more efficient government of the rebel States," and of the act supplementary thereto, passed on the twenty-third day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty seven, that the governments then existing in the rebel States of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Geor gia, Mississippi, Louisiana, Florida, Texas and

Arkansas, were not legal State governments, and WILMINGTON & MANCHES that thereafter said governments if continue were continued subject, in all respects, to the President-Henry M Drane. Military Commanders of the respective districts, and to the paramount authority of Congress.
