LEGISLATURE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
NIGHT SESSION.
TUESDAY, Feb. 23, 1869.

Mr. Stillely presented the credentials of Mr. Moore, the member elected from Chowan.

Mr. Moore was allowed to qualify and take his seat.

The consideration of the bill entitled an act to raise revenue was resumed and the question recurring upon Mr. Estes' substitute for Mr. Bowman's amendment to section 1, class 1, making the ad valorem tax upon property seven-twentieths instead of two-fifths.

After a long debate, Mr. Estes withdrew his substitute, and Mr. Bowman's amendment was adopted by a vote of yeas 79, nays none.

After some further debate and amendment, the bill passed its third reading.

SENATE.
WEDNESDAY, Feb. 24, 1869.
REPORT OF COMMITTEES.

Mr. Winstead, from the Committee on the Judiciary, reported favorably on bill concerning Guardian and Ward, and adversely on the bill to facilitate the payment of old debts.

Mr. Graham, from the Committee on the Judiciary, reported adversely, and asked to be discharged from the further consideration of the bill to amend the Constitution of the State so as to grant suffrage to females. Concurred in.

A message was received from the House transferring the following bills, viz: Bill to re-establish burnt records in the several counties of the State. Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

Bill to incorporate the Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Company. Referred to the Committee on Corporations.

Bill to amend an act to incorporate the North Carolina Loan and Trust Company. Referred to the Committee on Corporations.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.
By Mr. Barrow: A bill to incorporate the Independent Telegraph Company. Referred to the Committee on Corporations.

By Mr. Stephens: A bill to charter the Milton and Dan River Railroad Company. Referred to the Committee on Internal Improvements.

By Mr. White: A bill to require the registration of deeds, &c. Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

By Mr. Scott: A bill for the relief of B. Wallace, Sheriff of Duplin county. Referred to the Committee on Propositions and Grievances.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.
Consideration of the bill to provide a system of Public Instruction. The question pending on the bill was amended by the substitute offered by Mr. Sweet, to come in at the end of the substitute, (which we published yesterday) To prevent the children of the two races from attending the same school at the same time, which shall not be allowed.

Mr. Moore, of Carteret, called the previous question, which was sustained, and the amendment was adopted.

Mass. Forkner, Davis, and Jones, of Wake changed their votes to the affirmative.

Mr. Moore, of Carteret, suggested that the rest of the weak kneed Republicans be allowed to change their votes.

Mr. Sweet's substitute was then adopted as amended.

Mr. Lindsey moved to strike out the 32d section and said: Mr. President, The bill under consideration is entitled "an act to provide a system of Public Instruction." I think, sir, it would have been more appropriately named if it had been called an *Abomination of Desecration*. This proposition provides that the people of North Carolina shall be taxed to the enormous amount of 50 per cent. on all taxable property, in addition to the revenue bill, special taxes to build Railroads, and in addition to an appropriation of \$12,000 to the University. I have made an estimate based on the statement of the Governor in relation to the

amount of taxable property in the State, and, sir, this fifty per cent. tax provided in this amendment of dissolution will amount to one million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Now, sir, what is wanted with this large amount of money in addition to the funds in the hands of the Board of Education to build elegant Gothic structures to crown down on the poor ragged children of North Carolina—the proposition is absurd, the people do not want to be taxed to erect such buildings, they prefer to meet together and build their own school houses as has been the custom heretofore; besides, it is utterly impossible for the people of the State to bear this additional burden. I trust, sir, this Senate will give that calm consideration to this subject as it deserves, and strike out both the 292d and 33d sections which contain this provision.

Mr. Welker said he was satisfied that the Senator did not fully understand the provisions of the section. Its provisions simply authorize the question to be submitted to the people whether they will be taxed or not, limiting the amount to 50 per cent. The Constitution authorizes the Commissioners to levy a tax sufficient to meet all necessary expenses to provide a system of public schools, and this section simply limits them in the amount of tax they are authorized to levy.

Mr. Lindsey said that the Senator from Guilford had not fully explained the meaning of the section. He says it only provides that this question of taxation shall be submitted to a vote of the people. He could see an additional objection. He was not opposed to people voting to tax themselves, but he was opposed to non-tax payers voting to tax those who have the burden to bear, when, if they were required to pay a poll tax, it would meet all necessary expenses for carrying on the common schools, without this additional tax.

The debate continued at length. Mr. Lindsey's proposition was voted down.

Various amendments were offered to the sections. Pending its consideration, the Senate adjourned, without taking any final action.

By J. H. Harris, of Wake, colored: A bill to prevent the abandonment and neglect of wives by their husbands. Referred.

By consent Mr. Ames, from the committee on Internal Improvement, reported favorably upon the bill amending the charter of the Western Railroad Company, and to build a branch of said road to Selma, Johnston county, and also upon the bill constraining a Railroad through the counties of Granville, Wayne, Caswell, Rockingham, Stokes and Surry.

The bills were placed upon the Calendar.

On motion of J. H. Harris, of Wake, colored, the rules were suspended and the bill authorizing the city of Raleigh to issue bonds was taken up and passed its second reading by a vote of yeas 70, nays none.

On motion of Mr. Seymour the rules were suspended and the bill to lay off the homestead and personal property exemption was taken up.

On motion of Mr. Malone it was considered by sections.

Pending the adoption of section 4 the consideration of the bill was postponed in order to take up the bill to provide for an official declaration of the result of the late Congressional elections.

On motion the rules were suspended and the bill passed its several readings.
