LEGISLATURE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

MONDAY, March 1, 1869.

On motion of Mr. Malone, the rules were suspended and the bill to authorize the sale of counties of the State to take stock in E. I. Road Companies was taken up.

The Clerk read the bill.

The yeas and nays were called upon the bill on its third reading and resulted in a vote of yeas 45, nays 13, (no quorum.)

On motion of Mr. Malone, a call of the House was had and 72 members were ascertained to be present.

The bill just under consideration then passed its final reading by a vote of yeas 48, nays 14.

By J. S. Leary, colored: A bill to authorize the Commissioners of Cumberland to levy a special tax. Lies over.

On motion of Mr. Green, the rules were suspended, and the bill to remove obstructions to passage of fish up the Pee Dee and Yadkin Rivers was taken up and passed its several readings.

On motion of Mr. Moore, of Chowan, the rules were suspended and the bill to lay off the Homestead and personal property exemption was taken up and discussed during the remainder of the session.

On motion, the House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

SENATE.

Owing to the indisposition of our reporter we have no Senate report to-day. We learn, however, there was not much business of an interesting nature transacted. The school bill occupied nearly the whole session in discussion, without arriving at anything definite.

It is understood, however, that Senator Wynne made a strong speech in reference to the Secretary of State, which resulted in the appointment of a committee to investigate the affairs of that office.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

TUESDAY, March 2, 1869.

On motion of Mr. Malone, the rules were suspended, and the bill to authorize the Public Treasurer to supply temporary deficiencies in the Treasury was taken up.

[This bill allows the Treasurer to borrow money to meet the interest due Jan. 1st, 1869, and April 1st, 1869, at rates not exceeding 8 per cent., pledging as collateral for the payment of the same, the monies received from the tax list of 1869.]

The yeas and nays being ordered, the bill passed its second reading by a vote of yeas 64, nays 10.

By Mr. Barnett: A bill supplementary to the bill incorporating the Green Swamp Company. Bill placed upon the Calendar.

Mr. Seymour, from the committee on the Judiciary, reported favorably (with amendments) upon the bill concerning the settlement of the estates of deceased persons.

On motion of Mr. S., the rules were suspended and the bill just reported upon was taken up, passed its second reading, ordered to be printed and made special order for Wednesday at 11 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. Barnett, the rules were suspended and the bill to enable the Otham Railroad Company to complete its Road, was taken up.

Pending the discussion upon the bill the special order was announced, to-wit:

The bill laying off the homestead and personal property exemption.

The question recurred upon an amendment offered by Mr. Welch, to the 16th section which was adopted.

The discussion on the bill consumed the remainder of the time, and pending the adoption of an amendment offered by Mr. Post, to be known as sections 27 and 28, the further consideration of the bill was postponed until 7 o'clock this evening.

Mr. Hinant, from the Committee on Enrollment, reported the following bills as being correctly enrolled, to-wit:

Bill to incorporate the Littleton Manufacturing Company.

Bill to authorize elections in certain towns in the State.

Bill to be entitled an act to incorporate the New Hanover Agricultural Society.

Bill to enable the city of Raleigh to borrow money for certain purposes.

A message was received from the Governor, transmitting the report of W. C. Kerr, State Geologist. Ordered to be printed.

On motion the House then adjourned.
