Insane Asylum of North Carolina.

THE FOLLOWING EXPRACTS OF LAWd In relation to the Insane Asylum, are publicated for the information of the public. The following is Section 27 of Chapter 67, Acts of 1898-19, ratified March 9th, 1863:

"Enc 27. The expectes of carrying any insane person to the Asylum, and of removing him or her therefrom, shall be paid out of the Public Treasury upon a warrant of the Superintendent, approved by the Governor, unless such person shall have property sufficient for the parmant thereof, and in that case they shall be paid out of the proceeds of such propesty upon order made for that parpose by the Clerk of the buparior Court of the proper county."

The following is section 3, of an "Act in relation to the Insane Asylum of North Carolina," ratified April 5th, 1871:

"SEO. 5. Section 27 of An Act in relation to the Lunatic Asylum, ratified the 2th day of March, 1865, is amanded by adding thereto the following Provise:

Provided, That the Esperimendent shall not sign any warrant for the carrying to or removal from the Insane Asylum, of any insane person until there shall be anhibited to said Superintendent and filed in his keeping a certificate under the official seal of the Clerk of the Superior Count of the county whose such insans person was brought, or to which he is to be removed, that he has not property sufficient to pay such expense."
