Berlin has now 828,000 inhabitants, and besides the capital Prussia has ten cities with a population of 100,000 in round numbers or upwards. They are: Breslan, 200,000; Elberfeld Barmen, 160,000; Cologne, 130,000; Konigberg, 112,000; Magdeburg, with its suburbs, Neustadt, Sudenburg and Buckan, 110,000 : Hanover, 105,000 ; Frankfort-on-Main, with Bockenheim and Borbheim, 104,000; Dantzic, 100,000; Stettin, 97,000; and Altona, 95,000. In the rest of Germany there are four cities which have a popu lation exceeding 100,000, viz: Hamburgh 240,000; Munich, 190,000; Dre4den, 177, 000; and Leipsic, 107,000; while four have nearly reached that figure, viz: Stuttgard, 92,000; Noremberg, 87,000; Bremen, 80,000; and Strasburgh, 85,000 .-Besides the above-mentioned cities, Prussia contains seventeen towns with more than 30,000 inhabitants, which, according to the new regulations, will therefore each form an independent administrative circle. AND WHEREAS, by a supplementary convention signed at Washington on 2nd February, 1871, the rathinations whereof were exchanged on the 4th May, 1871. AFTER RECTIVE that by the second article of the said first convention it had been stipulated that the MANNER, in which the contracting parties who had emigrated or might emigrate from the dominions of one to those of the other party, of their naturalization and the reamption of their naturalization, might be made and publicly declared, shown be agreed upon by the Governments of the respective countries: 17 was, by Article 1, AGREED, as follows, viz. "Such renunciation by an original citizen of the United States of British nationality shall, within the territories and jurisdiction of the United States, be made in duplicate, in the presence of any Court authorized by law for the time being to admit allens to naturalization, or beinge the Clerk or Prothomotary of any such Court; if the declarant be beyond the territories of the United States, it shall be made in duplicate, before any Diplomatic or Consular officer of the United States. One of such duplicates shall remain of record in the custedy of the Court or officer in whose presence it was made; the other shall be, without delay, transmitted to the Department of State.

ALTHOUGH the Supplemental Convention of the 23d of February last only requires that American citizens who have been naturalized as British subjects shall make the Declaration of Renunciation before a United States Court of Justice, or Diplomatic or Consular officer of the United States, yet it is necessary, to meet the requirements of the British Act of Parliament, that the Declaration shall also be made before one of the British Judicial, Diplomatic or Consular officers mentioned in the 3d Section.

No Fre will be levied for receiving these Declarations.
