They hallooed at him and told him to get out of the way,, but being rather deaf, he did not hear them, and the tree fell on him and killed him .-He was a former slave of Gen. Washington, and was 12 years old when Gen. Washington gave him his choice to live with him at Mt. Vernon or be sold. He preferred being sold, and was sent to Richmond and put on the block and was bought by a member of the Lea family in this county, and has remained in that family ever since.

Colored West Point Cadet Withdrawn. Cadet Samuel Gibbs, colored,

of the Secretary of State of Florida, withdrew from West Point on Monday. Sam'l (Hibbs was appointed a codet in May, 1872, by a colored Congressman from Florida, passed the preliminary examination, and entered the Academy in June. A currespondent from West Point tells the reason of the withdrawal. He says: "The January examination, which closed about a week ago, and which proved death to the military aspirations of Cadet Gibbs, are represented to have been unusually severe and searching and about twenty of the backward young men were found, which implies that they were deficient in marks, and failed to pass an examination. In other words, when a cadet in 'found,' he is lost to the Academy, and returns to civil life." The same correspondent states that, while Gibbs was not maltreated, he, with Smith, the other colored cadet, was completely estracised, socially, by the other eadets.
