San FRANCISCO, April 27 .- The Indians have appeared on Lewis river region for fifty years. settlement with paint. A general outbreak in eastern Oregon is feared and the settlers ask arms. There is nothing from the lava beds.

The Court of Claims awarded Eugene Ticketman, of Prussia, \$13,000 for the loss caused by the detention of the ahip Essex, by the order of General Butler while commanding at New Orleans. The Court adjourned to next Monday, when it will clear the docket of the cotton cases and then adjourn to October.

In the Supreme Court, in the case o the Osborne Southern Express Company, vs. the City of Mobile, decision is affirmed and the tax levied by Mobile sustained.

The Planters' Bank of Tennesse vs. the Union Bank of Louisians. Remittances and collections due the Planters' Bank were paid by the Union Bank to the military by order of Gen. Banks. The Court held that the tender of Confederate money, when such money had no value, did not extinguish the debt; that Gen. Banks had no authority to order the debt to be paid, and that an obedience to that order did not exonerate the Union Bank,

Justice Bradley dissented, holding that Congress having intervened to protect Gen, Banks, and other officers in similar circumstances, from the responsibility for illegal commands enforced by military power, the Government should respond to the injured party.
