THE MODOC WAR.

THE MODOCOS BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN REFORMED.

LARGE SUPPLIES OF AMMUNITION IN THE HANDS OF THEIR ALLIES.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—Night.—Dispatches state that the Modocos are going toward the Pitt River country. The trails show that the Modocos and Pitt River Indians have been in constant communication. It is believed that the Pitts are with Captain Jack now. The Pitts are also out of their country. Twenty-five Pitts were seen at Surprise Valley, but they suddenly disappeared. It is reported that much ammunition was sold to the Pitts. They have held several councils, and their attitude is threatening. Old Shave Head tells them that they must fight or go to the reservation.

GRANT ON LOUISIANA.

TWENTY DAYS' GRACE.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Night.—The following excited surprise in all circles. Senator West, with the others, being equally surprised.

A PROCLAMATION. Whereas, Under the pretence that William P. Kellogg, the Executive of Louisiana, and the officers associated with him in the State administration were not duly elected, certain turbulent and disorderly persons have combined together, with force and arms, to resist the laws and constituted authorities of the State; and whereas, it has been duly certified that the proper local authorities, and been practically determined by the inferior and Supreme Courts of said State that said officers are entitled to hold their offices respectively, and execute and discharge the functions thereof; and whereas, Congress, at its late session, upon a due consideration of the subject, tacitly recognized the said Executive and his associates, then and now in office, by refusing to take any action thereon; and whereas, it is provided in the Constitution of the United States that said officers are entitled to hold their offices respectively, and execute and discharge the functions thereof; and whereas, it is provided in the laws of the United States that, in all cases of insurrection in any State, or of obstruction to the laws thereof, "it shall be lawful for the President of the United States, on application of the legislature of such State or of the executive, when the legislature cannot be convened, to call forth the militia of any other State or States, or to employ such part of the land and naval forces as shall be judged necessary for the purpose of suppressing such insurrection, or causing the laws to be duly executed; and whereas, the legislature of said State is not now in session and cannot be convened in time to meet the present emergency, and the executive of said State, under section 4, of article 7th of the Constitution of the United States, and the laws passed in pursuance thereof, has therefore made application to me for such part of the military force of the United States as may be necessary and adequate to protect said State and the citizens thereof against domestic violence, and to enforce the due execution of the laws; and whereas, it is required that whenever it may be necessary in the judgment of the President to use the military force for the purpose aforesaid, he shall forthwith, by proclamation, command such insurgents to disperse and retire peaceably to their respective homes within a limited time. Now, therefore,

I, U. S. Grant, President of the United States, do hereby make proclamation and command said turbulent and disorderly persons to disperse and retire peaceably to their respective abodes within twenty days from this date, and hereafter to submit themselves to the laws and constituted authorities of said State, and I invoke the aid and co-operation of all good citizens thereof to uphold the law and preserve the public peace.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this 22d day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and of the Independence of the United States the ninety-seventh.

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EUROPE.

THE BUTCHERY BY THE CARLISTS. HOSTAGES TO BE HELD. LEVY EN MASSE EXPECTED.

BARCELONA, May 21.—Night.—Later advices from Santa Huja state that twenty of those who surrendered were butchered. The fate of the others is unknown. They are believed to have been killed. The atrocities of the insurgents caused intense excitement here. The militia demanded that the insurgent prisoners held here be given them for butchery. The authorities refused to surrender them. They have been transferred from the fort to vessels in the harbor for safety. It is probable that a number of well known Carlists will be arrested and held as hostages.

A levy en masse is expected to act against the Carlists.

CINCINNATI, O., May 22.—Night.—Capt. Stein, of the steamer Kilgore, denies the reported cholera deaths on his boat while coming up the river.

PHILADELPHIA, May 22.—Night.—The new steamship Pennsylvania sailed on her first trip to Liverpool this morning, with fifty-six cabin and sixty-four steerage passengers and a full cargo. A salute of fifty guns was fired from the wharf to commemorate the event.

FORT SANDERS, WYOMING, May 22.—Night.—Two companies of the Fourth Infantry, en route for the Modoc war, have been ordered to remain here.

BALTIMORE, May 22.—Night.—The representative from Great Britain has been introduced and addressed the Assembly.

CLEVELAND, OHIO, May 22.—Night.—Acherast, a permanent resident of Sandusky, was shot dead on the street today. Dr. Mayor Jesse Griggs was being arrested on suspicion.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—Night.—A company of forty volunteers from Douglas county, Oregon, passed through Portland today en route for the Modoc country.

The British steamship Lord of Innes is two days overdue from Hong Kong.

MEXICO.

NEWS FROM THE INTERIOR. CONGRESS TO ADJOURN VERY SOON.

CITY OF MEXICO, May 15.—Congress will adjourn in a fortnight until September. The act allowing religious manifestations outside of churches has been repealed.

Nothing has been done in railroad matters. The riot in the town of Juchitan, in Tehuantepec, resulted in 30 killed and a great many wounded.

LITTLE ROCK, May 22.—Night.—The Assembly appointed the Executive Committee for the current year and adopted rules for the guidance of trustees. Adjourned sine die.

TEXAS.

COL CLARK ATTACKS THE KICKAPOOS ON MEXICAN SOIL.

CAUSING MUCH INDIGNATION ACROSS THE RIO GRANDE.

SAN ANTONIO, May 22.—Night.—Col. McKenzie, commanding at Fort Clark having failed to stop the raiders across the Rio Grande and attacked the Kickapoo on Mexican soil, killing 19 warriors, captured 40 squaws, and much plunder. Much indignation exists across the Rio Grande on account of this incursion. Col. McKenzie lost 1 killed and 2 fatally wounded.

PENNSYLVANIA.

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT.

SHAMONTO, May 22.—Night.—At the laying of the corner stone of the new Catholic Church to-day the platform fell with one hundred people. Three persons were killed, fifteen seriously and thirty-five more or less hurt. Bishops Wood and O'Hara, with twenty assisting clergymen, went down but escaped slightly injured.

GOTHAM.

THE SUPREME COURT WON'T TOUCH THE TRAIN CASE.

NEW YORK, May 22.—Night.—The Supreme Court has refused to interfere in the Train case. An examination can take place any time before his consignment to the Insane Asylum at Utica.

THE REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

NOYES NOMINATED FOR GOVERNOR AND HART FOR LIQUOR TENANT GOVERNOR.

THE PLATFORM ADOPTED.

COLUMBUS, May 22.—Night.—The Republican Convention has nominated Noyes for Governor and Hart for Lieutenant Governor. The platform is mostly a recapitulation. The industry of the country should have the cheapest and best transportation; demands pure official conduct and the punishment of unfaithful officers; denounces Credit Mobiliers; the increase of salaries was condemned as unwise. It favors the shortening of the probationary term to citizenship.
